

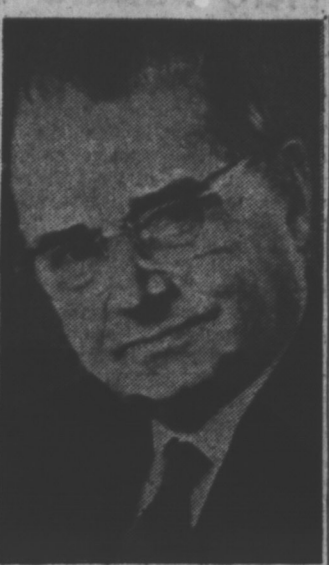
Opposition Leader Shaw Has New Year's Message

ECONOMY INCREASED

HALIFAX (CP) — The Maritime office says that for Prince Edward Island and most of Nova Scotia, today's forecast reads much like Friday's weather—cloudy with snowflurries and windy. But for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia's more sheltered leeward inlets, the skies will clear as the winds weaken, during the morning. Towards sunset the winds in the rest of the district will diminish, and the clouds will flatten and finally fade. The first day of the New Year will be sunny and not quite so cold.

Interviewed yesterday, George W. Cheverie, manager of the Charlottetown Manpower Centre, said that it is planned to open an office in Souris in a week's time.

The new manpower office will be in the federal building, Souris and for the present will be open for one day a week — on Tuesdays. This arrangement is, however, temporary and changes of times or days will be made to suit local conditions and requirements.
