WILL NOT GO BACK
VICTORIA (CP)—Two hundred boilermakers, suspended for five days from H.M.C. Dockyard here when they walked off their jobs, have decided not to go back to work until the dispute is settled.

A meeting of members of the International Brotherhood of Boilermakers, Iron Shipbuilders, Blacksmiths and Helpers, Local 191, Tuesday voted to stay out until the dockyard pays the wage rates prevailing in other Victoria shipyards. The men walked off their jobs after dockyard superintendent Commodore B. R. Spensley suspended seven men for refusing to work on a job without payment of a "dirty work" premium of 25 per cent over their regular pay.

C.M.A. Annual Meeting Concludes

JASPER, Alta. (CP)—The Canadian Manufacturers' Association Wednesday elected officers for the coming year, asked the federal and Quebec governments to do something about the double income tax situation in Quebec, paid tribute to officers past and present for their services, and generally wrapped-up their three-day annual meeting.

Their done, many delegates and their wives left by special train on a post-meeting trip to Vancouver and Victoria.

J. A. Calder of Montreal is president for the coming year, succeeding J. D. Ferguson of Rock Island, Que. T. A. Rice of Hamilton is first vice-president, and J. N. W. Bulman of Winnipeg is second vice-president. In ordinary course, Mr. Rice will become president next year, and Mr. Bulman a year after that. J. Ross Belton of Toronto is treasurer.

The resolution concerning income tax urged that the federal and Quebec governments should initiate discussions without delay "to bring about an early and satisfactory solution" of the situation under which a large number of Quebec residents pay income tax to both governments, without allowance in either tax payment for what has been paid on the other.

A by-law amendment changed the name of the Maritime division to Atlantic division, in recognition of the inclusion of a Newfoundland branch.

MADE LIFE MEMBERS
Three past presidents were made life members. They are J. H. Sherrard, Montreal, president 1915-16; W. C. Coulter, Toronto, president 1922-23; and F. C. Brown, Vancouver, president 1937-38.

Mr. Sherrard is the senior living CMA past president. He and Mr. Brown are both natives of New Brunswick. Mr. Sherrard of Shediac and Mr. Brown of Peticodiac.

CMA in the last year has had three general managers: J. T. Sturrett, who retired a year ago after 41 years with the association; G. K. Shells, who died a few months after taking office; and John C. Whitelaw, appointed last December.

J. D. Ferguson, retiring president, said Wednesday that Mr. Sturrett "gave more to the success of the association than any other man," while Mr. Shells' contributions to Canada's effort in the Second World War would be part of Canada's history.

Mr. Runtz received the congratulations and good wishes from the meeting, as did Mrs. D. M. Gass, appointed vice-president for the province.

In a demonstration of post hypnotic suggestion, Mr. Barardo told a woman that upon awakening she would kiss a bald headed man in the audience. This she did much to the delight of those present and to the surprise of the gentleman concerned.
