Representatives from three P.E.I. plowing match associations will meet at O'Leary's on Wednesday, April 10, to form a Provincial Plowing Council. The meeting was called by David Pascook, provincial department of agriculture.

The Council became necessary as a result of the Canadian Plowing Council's decision to hold the Canadian Championship match here in Centennial year of 1964, if an organization was set up here to meet the requirements of the match.

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says a disturbance should move out of the Atlantic provinces by mid-afternoon today and rain should end by then in most sections of the district.

Regional forecast:

Atlantic and northern northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore: Rain, at times heavy ending during the night; coastal fog, very mild; south winds 25 with gusts to 40 shifting during morning to northwest 25 and diminishing.

Another Winnipeg delegate, Peter Theissen, charged that the United States is just as much at fault as Russia and Canada should remain uncommitted to nuclear weapons.

Armand Sikema, a Toronto delegate who said he was born in the Iron Curtain, sharply opposed any importing of nuclear weapons, but he said he would support any way and might start war at any minute. He favored nuclear arms for Canada now.

A less heated debate occurred over a resolution calling for a knowledge of English and French for appointment to senior posts in the civil service and Crown corporations. It was approved by a vote of 68 to 55 after Mr. Macdonnell had cautioned that it amounted to closing the door to civil service posts to a large number of Canadians.

Bob Amaron, Montreal law student, took issue with suggestions for delay, arguing that the present never seemed to be the right time to adopt such a resolution. Many who did not speak English were barred from civil service posts during morning.

800-YEAR-OLD SALZAR VIOLIN

Long River Man Bequeathed Ancient Musical Instrument

A Salzar violin, estimated by experts to be between 700 and 800 years old, is shown above by the owner, Heath Campbell of Long River, whose grandfather bequeathed it to him.

Little is known of Salzar as his name did not become famous until long after his death. He is believed to have made only 10 of the instruments. One of them now rests in a museum of 2500-year-old instruments. The Salzar is reputed to be the equal of a Stradivarius and Mr. Campbell hopes to find someone who is interested in purchasing the old masterpiece, which was at one time insured for \$100,000.

Mr. Campbell's grandfather came into possession of the violin through a pawnbroker friend in Chicago. An elderly gentleman pawned the violin for \$30 stating he would return to redeem it within two or three months. However, the man failed to return and after approximately one year, the pawnbroker asked Mr. Campbell's grandfather if he would like to buy it.

The instrument was appraised by several experts who were unanimous in the belief it was an original Salzar. The name D. Salzar is stamped on the inside bottom of the instrument.

N.Y. Stocks Decline 3rd Straight Week

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week depicted a downward movement from the steel labor settlement and other items of good economic news and stretched its decline through the third straight week.

One sharp rally was the best the market could offer. The Dow Jones was lower, or at best, mixed.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed at 1,661.95. More than twice as many stocks declined as advanced during the week. The market was down 1.47% in the week. The Associated Press average of 400 stocks fell 2.30 to 287.70. Stocks dropped despite such news as this:

Auto assemblies were scheduled last week at the highest rate of the year; department store sales rose to a record 877 million in March; steel production gained in the latest week; Intalment buying increased in February; total business sales advanced to a record in February.

Day-trading in the market performance was as follows:

Sharp declines on Monday and Tuesday were moderate on Wednesday as the average approached 1962 lows; a vigorous rally on Thursday, steep, mixed market on Friday, with the average slightly lower.
