



30 GRADUATE FROM BUSINESS COURSE

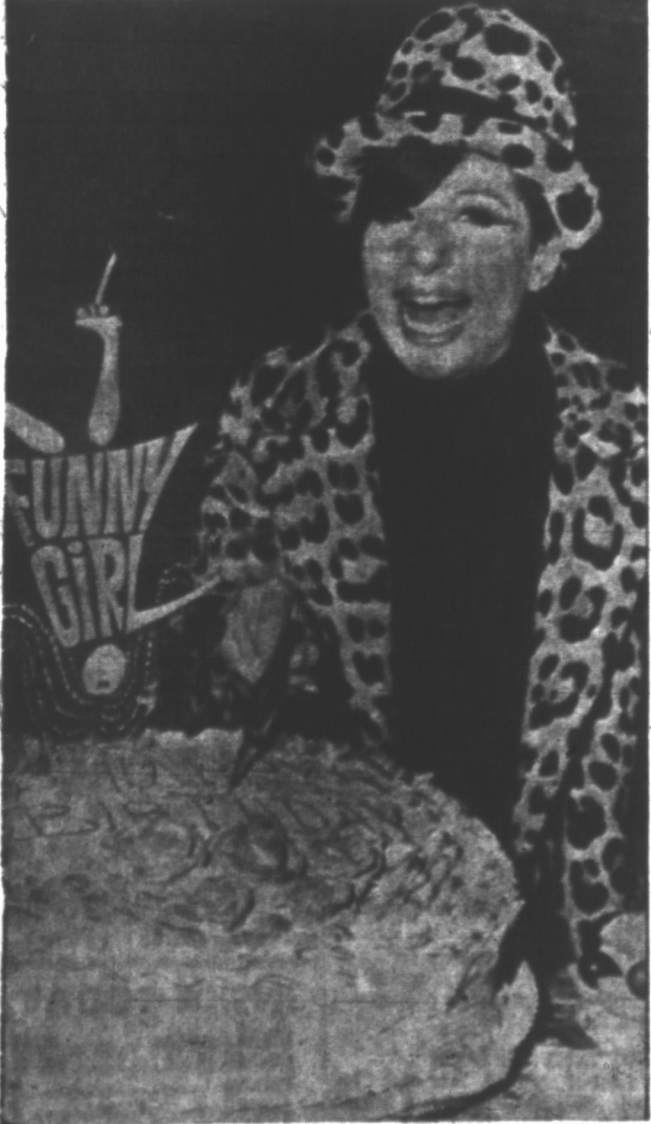

150 Steers Are Entered In Easter Beef Show, Sale

Approximately 150 steers have been entered in the Easter Beef Show and Sale which will be held on Thursday and Friday of this week. It has been learned from Dr. H. H. Kelly, secretary of the twin event. The show will be staged on Thursday afternoon and the sale will be held the following day. Judging will get underway at one o'clock p.m. on Thursday and the sale of steers will begin at the same time the following afternoon. Bill Bennett, retired livestock superintendent for the New Brunswick department of agriculture will judge the show. The steers will be sold by Claude Craswell, Winsloe. Allison Proffitt, Freetown is show manager. Parker Jewell, York is assistant manager. There are 18 entries in the 4-H Club class. There are approximately 80 farmers showing steers in the regular classes with many of them showing two or three animals. George C. Kitson, Hampshire is the president of the show and sale organization. The animals will be weighed in at Swift Canadian Company, Belmont Street between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on March 31. The steers will be called between 8:00 and 11:00 a.m. on April 1. A sale of beef breeding stock has been cancelled because there were not enough animals entered.

Premier Is Rather Pleased With Film On Centennial

Premier Walter R. Shaw said he felt rather happy about Sunday's showing of the National Film Board production of "The Hundredth Summer." The film depicted Centennial Year celebrations in three villages in the province. He said the film got away from the prominent people involved in the over-all celebrations and took it to the people themselves in three small villages. It was a good story of interest to farmers, fishermen and the small villager. It showed the organization these people took on their own to build up centennial celebrations as a community project. The premier said "we in the middle of the over-all celebration tend to assess local developments from the standpoint of, and on the part of the government. The film touched the work of local people in the small areas involved and that's what made it so pleasing." The premier was back at his desk Monday after a six-week session of the legislature which closed Friday. He said "now that the air has cleared to some extent, the government will carry on with its development programs. "One of the first tasks will be to get adjusted to our new industrial development organization. Meanwhile, we will proceed as usual on investigation work in resource development. We have some leads on industrial development and while the prospects are not as large as some of the industries that have located here, we find them encouraging." Premier Shaw said negotiations are going on with the federal department of industry to have the province termed a designated area in which new industry would qualify for federal benefits such as tax incentives. "We find the preliminary discussions encouraging," he said. Asked if any immediate changes were to be made in government, the premier said "government departments will carry on as in the past; no cabinet changes are under consideration at present and there are no plans for an election this year. We're going to get out and do a job."

Early Trip Of Ferry Being Restored Today

MONCTON, (Special) — The Canadian National Ferry service between Borden, P.E.I., and Cape Tormentine, N.B., will return to its normal winter schedule today (Tuesday). It was announced Monday by J. G. Davis, manager of CNS Maritime area. Earlier this month ice conditions in the Northumberland Strait forced CN to cancel the scheduled 7 a.m. sailing from Borden and the corresponding return trip from Cape Tormentine. This was the only way the company could guarantee to have the Abegweit in Borden to take train No. 39 from the island at 10:05 a.m. Traffic was handled on non-scheduled crossings made round the clock to keep the flow of freight moving to and from the island. Canadian National officials feel that ice conditions have improved to an extent which will enable the early-morning crossings to be made without affecting the operation of the train. Under the normal winter schedule there are ten crossings daily, five from Borden and five from Cape Tormentine.

Big Year Is Anticipated In Rural Beautification

Officers of the Rural Beautification Society of Prince Edward Island, at a recent meeting approved the prize list and competitions for 1965. The president of the society, R. B. Snazelle, Bunbury, advised interested groups and individuals to request their copy of the prize list as soon as possible and to be prompt in forwarding their entry form. He expects 1965 to be a real big year for the society as requests for information have been coming in all winter. Some of the changes from previous years are: The Class (c), third year, farm home improvement competition was dropped, due to lack of competition; this is probably due to the large amount of improvements made by contestants in their first two years of competition. In the small home improvement competition, the old division between new and old homes (3 years and over) was dropped. This year all small holdings will compete in one class, this competition is now on a county basis. The new community improvement competition will replace last year's special centennial competition. The flower garden, one room school, church cemetery and P.E.I. Tourist Association competitions were not changed.

Speeding Charge Is Withdrawn

A charge of speeding against Allison Hastell Robblee of Tryon was withdrawn yesterday when the case came before Magistrate James B. Johnston in Queens County Magistrate's Court. A week ago, Mr. Robblee pleaded not guilty to the charge and it was set down until this morning for trial. When Mr. Robblee was called Crown Prosecutor A. K. Scales made an application to have the information withdrawn. The application was granted and the case dismissed. George Louis Joseph of Pownall Street, charged with break, entry and theft, had his case adjourned. He was remanded until March 31 with bail to stand. One case of illegal possession of liquor cost the offender a fine of \$20 plus court and police costs.

Funeral services for a former resident of P.E.I., Rev. James W. Howe, were held recently from the United Church in Stanley, New Brunswick. The late Mr. Howe attended the University of New Brunswick and Mount Allison University, where he studied theology. He went to Japan in 1910 as a missionary and was ordained there in 1913. On his return to Canada, he held several pastorates throughout the Maritimes, including one at Wellington, P.E.I. After retiring in 1956, he and Mrs. Howe took up residence in Carleton, and in 1963 moved to Sackville, N.B. In 1964, they moved to a nursing home in Montreal where Mr. Howe died. Surviving are his wife, Lily, one daughter, Margaret (Mrs. G. W. Hall, Montreal), one son, Ralph, Sackville, and five grandchildren.
