To Discuss Suez Canal Question

CAIRO. (AP) — Authoritative Western sources said Wednesday British and Egyptian negotiators will establish informal contact soon in an effort to guarantee success of formal talks on the Suez canal zone.

The Egyptian army newspaper Al Tahrir said the United States made a five-point proposal to Egypt last week providing for the British to pull out of the canal zone within 18 months.

Under this reported plan for evacuating the 80,000 or so British troops now guarding the canal area, the British would leave behind a maximum of 4,000 technicians to maintain the base for not more than five years.

Al Tahrir said the American proposal was sent direct to Egypt by President Eisenhower. Although neither U. S. nor British embassy officials would comment on the report, its accuracy was generally accepted here because of the publication in which it appeared.

Informants said that Britain's top negotiator on Egyptian problems, Lt.-Gen. Sir Brian Robertson, will meet informally today with Col. Gamel Abdel Nasser, top Egyptian authority on the Canal Zone dispute.

Red Soldier Seeks Political Asylum

BERLIN. (AP)—A Soviet soldier deserted from the Russian war memorial in the Berlin Tiergarten Wednesday and asked political asylum in the West.

The 20-year-old private hid in bushes for two hours while other guards from the memorial hunted for him with tommyguns at the ready.

Then he threw away his cap, epaulets and pistol, and crept out of the Tiergarten to where a German-American movie company was shooting a Soviet escape scene on the bank of a nearby canal.

British authorities took custody of the soldier from West Berlin police and announced that he will be recognized as a political refugee. They refused to disclose his name.
