FIRE.—The alarm last night was for a slight fire in the bake-house of Murphy & Son.

HEARTZ'S HALL.—Rev Mr. Gordon of Boston will preach at Hartz's Hall tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock.

MISSION.—The Paulist Fathers will open a mission in St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, tomorrow. The mission will be continued during the week.

SHIPMENTS FALLING OFF.—Shipments of P. E. Island potatoes by steamer from St. John having fallen off owing doubtless to a drop in the price in Boston.—St John Sun.

A PROFITABLE MINE.—The Le Roi mine has declared a dividend of \$50,000. This is the twentieth dividend in two years, and swells the total to \$525,000. This is a pretty good showing for a British Columbia "baby."

FOUND DEAD.—A man who is thought to be Thomas Barrell Bell, formerly a tailor at Kensington, in this province, was recently found dead by the roadside in Northport, Washington. It is believed that he had been murdered and robbed.

DRAWN TO DEATH.—George, the 11 year old son of George McKnight of Stewarton, King's County, N. B., and his younger brother went to the pasture on Tuesday for the cows. George tied the end of a rope around a cow's neck and the other end to his body. The cow started to run and the poor little fellow was dragged over the rough stumpy field at a rapid rate. When his father reached the spot a few minutes later the boy was dead. The affair has cast a gloom over the entire community.

DIED ALONE.—On Tuesday morning some of the school children went into the house of Ross Casack in New Ireland, Albert county, and discovered the body of the old lady, who lived alone, stretched on the floor. Assistance was immediately called and she was found to have been dead for some time. She had milked her cow and the milk stood there in the pail. She had evidently fallen from her chair while in the act of eating her breakfast, as the things remaining on the table clearly showed.—Maple Leaf.

NEW YORK, October 12.—The Jeffersonian Democracy of Richard County, supporters of Henry George, have nominated a strong county ticket and will make a determined fight to beat the Tammany organization. Erastus Wiman is one of the nominees for Councilmen. Mr. Wiman, before he lost his fortune, Staten Islanders say, did more for the development of Richmond county than any other man, and he will poll a big vote. It was in attempting to give Staten Island an electric light system that he met his financial Waterloo. The regular organization refused to nominate him for the Council. He runs as an independent Democrat. He was bluntly told that he was "too independent to take orders."
