NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

A Little Loan of \$10,000,000.

A PROPOSITION DECLINED.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—Hon. Mr. Fielding, when in London, will float a loan for ten million dollars. Half the amount is to retire treasury bills now outstanding. The other five millions are to meet the Crow's Nest pass subsidy and to pay for the St. Lawrence canal enlargement.

The Government of Canada emphatically declines to accede to the request of the United States authorities that the Washington sealing conference shall include representatives of Japan and Russia.

Mr. Blake will return to Great Britain almost immediately.

WOLSELEY'S WARNING.

The Army Needs Improvement

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Lord Wolseley, in the course of a speech at Glasgow yesterday, said that the British army machinery was strained and out of gear. He advocated a sufficient increase of the force to meet all emergencies.

Continuing, the commander-in-chief remarked: "The navy has been restored to its ancient and proud pre-eminence. But it is a great folly to declare that only the navy is required for our protection. Great Britain requires a moderate sized army of perfect quality to protect the islands and hold her coal stations beyond the seas."

GLADSTONE'S DENUNCIATION

The European Concert in the East.

Result: Pain, Shame and Mischief.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Chronicle of yesterday publishes an extract from a letter written by Mr. Gladstone, under date of Sept. 22nd. In it Mr. Gladstone says that "the pain, shame and mischief of the last two years in the Eastern policy of Great Britain transcend entirely the powers of any language I could use concerning them. The sum is this: Firstly, a hundred thousand Armenians have been slaughtered with no security against a repetition, with greater profit to assassins; secondly, Turkey is stronger than at any time since the Crimean war; thirdly, Greece is weaker than at any time since she became a kingdom; fourthly, all this is due to the European concert—that is, the mutual hatred and distrust of the Powers."

M KENNA'S DECISION.

Appeal From It to be Made to Congress.

New York, September 22.—The Times says, speaking of Attorney-General McKenna's decision: "It will be a mortifying opinion to Senator Elkins, who had just avowed his authorship of it, and his share of responsibility for its incorporation in the Dingley law for a mischievous purpose. To the members of the Conference Committees of the two Houses the opinion can only be regarded as a calm and argumentative, but none the less, humiliating verdict of incompetency to make a bad law, if they intended that it should be as bad as the harshest interpretation of it would make it: and of stupidity if the conferees imagined that they had accomplished all that they were invited to do. If the sole object of the contrivers of this section, deprived by the interpretation of the Attorney-General, of all new force it was expected to have, was to throw into the hands of the American trans-continental railways some of the traffic now enjoyed by the Canadian Pacific Railway, that object has been defeated by the opinion. That an opinion favorable to such an interpretation was expected is obvious from the declarations of persons in favor of a discriminating duty that the opinion is regarded as unsound."

"The appeal from the Attorney General's opinion will be to Congress at its next session. Smarting under Mr. McKenna's lecture, it is safe to assume that Allison and Dingley will not undertake to 'slip in' without the fullest discussion, or in spite of an intelligent enquiry and opposition, any interpretation of the law or policy of protection antagonistic to the business interests of the whole country."

To those zealous promoters of the development of the American merchant marine who relied upon an opinion favorable to them to force importations of foreign goods by American vessels, or by foreign vessels through American ports only, or to accept a penalty of ten per cent, which they supposed had been inflicted upon merchandise imported in foreign ships through "contiguous territory," the Attorney-General must appear to be heartlessly and hopelessly un-American. For he has swept aside as worth of small consideration and prompt rejection, two of the contentions raised by the authors of this section that promised to be so vexatious, and has devoted his legal ability chiefly to showing the inconsistency of the third contention, that proposed discrimination said to be against goods in a foreign country not contiguous to the United States but which shall "come into" the United States from a contiguous country. The Attorney-General considers such importations as practically "direct" as was maintained by the representatives of those international railway companies who appeared before him while he was considering the request for an interpretation of the language of the law.

The World says: "Section 22 was 'slipped' into the tariff bill, as Speaker Reed has told us. That is to say, Congress never meant to enact any such thing, but it did enact it, thanks to the activity and ingenuity of a slippery slipper or slippers in the employ of the railroad 'combine.' Now McKenna has slipped it out. In a decision the meaning of which no God of Olympus could possibly fathom, he rules that the section has no validity, or, accurately speaking, that it does not mean what it says or anything else. This makes an end of 22. And that is well. The section was intended to prevent the importation of goods over the Canadian Pacific Railway, and thus to compel importers to bring in their goods at San Francisco and pay foreign charges to the Huntington crowd."

"To the ordinary intelligence, section 22 is perfectly plain and simple. It imposes a discriminating duty of 10 per cent on all goods that cannot come into the United States through Canada. But McKenna is a lawyer, and as such he knows how to 'wallop' his decision in a maze of meaningless words that seem very erudite."

VANCOUVER, Sept. 21.—On Sunday the 12th inst, the Hon. G. R. Colborne, aide de camp to Geo. Montgomery Moore, commander of the Imperial forces in Canada, effected a gallant rescue of a five-year-old child from drowning, by plunging after the little fellow into the waters of English Bay, adjoining Stanley Park in this city, the boy having fallen over the low parapet of the park bridge, which there spans a narrow tidal inlet. The rescue was speedily effected, neither of the immersed being much the worse save for a thorough drench with salt water, though the boy was naturally much frightened. The promptitude of the gallant officer was much commended by the few who happened to be near at the moment. Mr. Colborne was on a brief visit to Vancouver at the time in the company of his chief.
