

Book Reveals "Cat's Eyes" Had Nazi Brass Worried

LONDON (Reuters)—The German high command was baffled and worried. It seemed that Britain had bred a new type of fighter pilot, men with the eyes of cats who could see in the dark.

Night after night Hitler's bombers were being sent in waves over London. It was against the laws of nature that the British fliers could pick them out so accurately and shot them down from the night skies. Yet it was happening.

One pilot in particular stood out from among the airmen who were defending London so successfully—John Cunningham.

No German bomber was safe once it got in his range. British newspapers explained his air victories simply. He was a pilot with remarkable night vision.

The Germans believed it—for a time. But then they found that they were coming up against too many men with this same "remarkable night vision."

Today, Group Capt. Cunningham, now a chief test pilot for a leading airplane firm, is trying to get into the plates allocated to night patrols, the vital part of which was a black metal box sprouting knobs and cables.

Britain's wartime scientists had succeeded in producing a form of airborne radar. A controller on the ground directed a fighter into the vicinity of the enemy plane until it showed up on the fighter's own radar screen. The radar operator in the fighter then took over and tried to bring his pilot within visual range of his victim.

All that remained was to shoot him down.

By the summer of 1943, such had been the development of radar that some of the earlier types were released for use abroad. But all night fighters equipped with the latest models were still forbidden to go over enemy territory in case they were brought down and thus revealed the precious secret to the Germans.

Former Lobster Factory At Geo'town Destroyed By Fire

Fanned by a strong westerly wind fire quickly and completely destroyed a former lobster factory on the Queens Wharf at Georgetown yesterday afternoon between 1:30 and 2 p.m.

The building, formerly known as The Hatchery was built in the early 1900's by the Dominion Government as a hatchery for lobsters and for many years was used for that purpose. Prior to the second World War, C.H. Llewellyn and Sons and The Southern Packing Co. took over the building and used it for a packing plant for lobsters, cod, clams, quahaugs, muscles and beef. In recent years the firm of Redmond Exports Ltd. have packed lobsters in the building.

But the factory had not been in use for canning for the past two seasons. It was presently used to store bait and fishermen supplies. At the time of the fire it contained two boilers, a sealing machine, all the factory tables and equipment, also in the building were some barrels of bait and other supplies.

It is uncertain as to how the fire started.

The Queens Wharf was saved from destruction by the arrival of the town fire engine. Fields in Burnt Point, some half to three quarters of a mile distance across water were ignited by flying embers.

Also lost in the fire was a lobster fishing boat and engine which was moored along side the building and was owned by Clifford and Roland Gallant.

The building was presently owned on a fifty fifty basis by the Southern Packing Co., and Redmond Exports Ltd.

Loads Pulpwood At King's Ports

The M.V. Bartholemew, under command of Capt. J. J. Trembley, left port at Montague yesterday, after taking 1,200 cords of pulpwood for the Anglo Canadian Co. of Quebec City. She was loaded by Boates (P.E.I.) Ltd. The balance of her cargo 500 cords, will be taken on at Georgetown. The Bartholemew will be working Gaspé ports until the latter part of the summer, but expects to return to Montague in July.

Committed To Supreme Court

The preliminary hearing of Aubrey Russell Moore of Abney charged with rape under section 136 of the Criminal Code was completed at Georgetown on Thursday before Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet and the accused was committed to the July sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown for trial. The accused did not present any evidence at the preliminary hearing.
