GRECIAN ART TABLEAU.

The Grecian Art Tableaux Company, of Boston, gave their opening entertainment at the Opera House last evening, and made a splendid impression. The programme presented was of a most artistic and refining character, and the eminently critical audience manifested its appreciation by vigorous and oft-repeated hand-clapping. The tableaux designed and arranged by Miss Willis, were, in themselves, worth more than the price of admission. There were so many points that space will not admit of special mention; indeed it would be unfair to single out any one where all were so good. There were illustrations from Biblical times and Grecian history, followed by illustrations dealing with school and home life, some of them of a very humorous character. All the groups were formed on the stage in rapid succession, and as the colored lights from a powerful lantern on the balcony were projected upon the screen which formed the background of the pictures, not a few of the scenes had to be repeated. "The Brook," was sweetly sung by Miss Lois Shepard, and the audience was so delighted that the clever artist was obliged to sing two more solos, her second being "The Swanee River." Her first and second songs were beautifully illustrated. Miss Blanche Sears charmed everyone with her exquisite violin playing, and both vocal numbers were encored. Miss Willis rendered her three readings so cleverly that in each case she also had to respond to an encore. Miss Isola Sears played the accompaniments very skilfully and shared the applause. To-night the company give their second and last entertainment in Charlottetown, and a performance equal, if not superior, to that of last evening is promised. An interesting feature will be views showing the Boston of yesteryear and the Boston of the present time. There are no tedious waits between numbers, and the entertainment is over in good season. GOOD TEMPLARS.

Annual Session of the Grand Lodge Held at St. Peter's.

The annual session of the Grand Lodge, Independent Order of Good Templars, met with Grand Lodge at St. Peter's on Thursday forenoon. The different Lodges were well represented. The report of the Chief Templar showed that there had been an increase of 165 members, and that there were seven Lodges and one District Lodge in the jurisdiction, besides three new Juvenile Temples. CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Work on the Park Roadway to be Proceeded With at Once.

There was a full attendance of members at the special meeting of the City Council called for last evening to consider the construction of the Victoria Park Roadway.

After Mayor Dawson had explained the purpose for which the meeting was called he referred to the report of the Grand Jury respecting the nuisance created by the sewer leading from the post office building to the water at the foot of Great George Street, and showed that he had interested himself in this matter three or four weeks ago by submitting his correspondence with the Public Works Department.

Councillor Nicholson then submitted the following resolution, which was seconded by Councillor Douse:

Resolved, That the City of Charlottetown be urged in their demands that the approaches to the Park be forthwith constructed.

Therefore Resolved, That this Council do not authorize the expenditure of a sum of money for the construction of a roadway and breakwaters per plan prepared by J. P. Nicholson, Surveyor, that is to say, commencing at the north-west angle of H. J. Cunliff's property on Kent Street and running along the shore until it reaches the bank at or near His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor's bathing house.

After some discussion, the resolution was put and carried, Councillor Hughes dissenting.

Councillor Nicholson then introduced the following resolution, which was seconded by Councillor Douse:

Resolved, That the Public Property Committee be appointed to superintend and to engage a competent person to oversee and inspect the construction of said breakwater.

Councillor Hughes moved an amendment providing that the Street Committee have charge of the work. It was carried.

The amendment was declared carried, Councillors Nicholson and Douse voting against it.

Councillor Nicholson moved, seconded by Councillor Douse:

Resolved, That His Worship the Mayor be authorized and instructed to issue debentures out of the funds of the corporation for a sum not exceeding \$5,000 for the purpose of constructing said breakwater and roadway, in denominations of \$50 each, for a period of 20 years, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding four per cent. per annum, such debentures to be issued from time to time during the progress of the work as this Council may deem requisite and expedient.

After discussion Councillor Hughes moved in amendment that Councillor Nicholson have leave to withdraw his motion.

The amendment was carried by the casting vote of the Mayor, Councillors McCarron, Hughes, Horne and Hopper voting in favor of the amendment, and Councillors Nicholson, Douse, Johnson and Taylor opposing it.

Mayor Dawson, in giving his casting vote, said he did not consider it advisable to issue debentures until it was known how much money the city would get from the Dominion Government.

Meeting adjourned sine die.

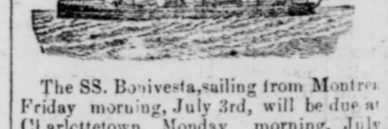
