### Citizens Try To Stop Nats Shift To L. A.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Calvin Griffith, president of Washington Senators, began talks Tuesday with local leaders anxious to rid him of the idea of taking the American League baseball club to another city.

"They realize I'm not kidding about it," Griffith said afterward. The senators' boss, who disclosed last week he is considering a shift of franchise, conferred with Philip L. Graham, publisher of the Washington Post and Times Herald, and John S. Hayes, head of the newspaper's radio and TV stations.

Hayes described the conversation over lunch as "purely exploratory," to ascertain just what inducements Griffith has received to pull out the club after 56 seasons in Washington.

Griffith has discussed a possible move with representatives of Los Angeles, San Francisco and Louisville, Ky.

The Senators are contemplating a move in the wake of two seasons in which they finished eighth and in the seventh in the standings and in the major league cellar as far as home attendance is concerned.

### Western Radio Stations To Carry Big Four Broadcasts

EDMONTON (CP) - This Saturday four Western Canada radio stations will carry play-by-play accounts of football games in the eastern Big Four league.

Each account will have the same essential facts of the play, but each will vary in descriptive commentary and background sounds according to the imagination of the announcers and producers.

The broadcasts, as they have been every Saturday since the season started, will be recreated accounts of the action.

Many listeners may know that the commentary, crowd noises and public address announcements heard in the background, will originate in a studio far from the gridiron. And, under CBC regulation, each station will tell its audience after each quarter, that the broadcast is a recreation.

**MANY LISTENERS**  
By any rating, however, each of the stations' accounts will have many listeners in the football-mad West.

The stations carrying the recreations this year are CICA, Edmonton, where Maurice Carter is the play-by-play announcer; CFRN, Edmonton, with Al Shaver giving the accounts; CFAC, Calgary with Eric Bishop in the microphone; and CFUN, Vancouver, where Bob Smith is the reporter.

Opinions vary as to the number of listeners who realize the broadcasts are not "live." But the stations are unanimous in stating that the number of listeners is large.

Four games was originated in 1954 by Carter, whose Edmonton station then did not have the direct broadcast of any of the Western Interprovincial Football Union games and found it too costly to bring in direct accounts from Big Four cities.

**INSTANT HIT**  
The recreations were an instant hit, says Carter, and now his station, as others juggle sponsored programs to allow time for the football accounts, which are paid for by selling spot commercials.

The accounts may well sound as though they are coming directly from Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto or Hamilton.

Actually, all that comes directly is a typewritten sketch of each play, moved into the studio by direct telegraph line that will deliver something like this: "Montreal 45-Etcheberry handoff Abruzzi, right tackle six yards, tackle by Jones."

The announcer dramatizes from this and usually is from three to five minutes behind the actual play. Crowd noises are dubbed in

### Hockey Reps To Meet In Antigonish

HALIFAX (CP) - Hockey representatives from six centres meet in Antigonish, N.S. Oct. 14 to make known their final intentions on the formation of a Nova Scotia senior A league.

A preliminary meeting held last Sunday attracted hockey men from Glace Bay, Sydney, Halifax, New Glasgow, Amherst and Charlottetown.

Oct. 26 was set as a tentative league opening date and representatives agreed to limit player imports to six per team if the league operates.

Formation of the Nova Scotia league would automatically dissolve the Atlantic Coast league which operated last year with entries from Moncton, Saint John, Amherst and Fredericton.

**SOME OPPOSITION**  
Glace Bay and Sydney, members of the old Maritime major league, have been without senior competition for three seasons. Halifax, Maritime major champions for two seasons, joined the Antigonish - Pictou - Colchester league for the 1954-55 season but

was without senior competition last winter.

Charlottetown, also prominent in Atlantic coast and major league play in post war years, had no club in senior hockey last season.

Moncton, Fredericton and Saint John have indicated little desire to continue with the Atlantic league and favor formation of a separate New Brunswick senior loop which would likely include a Sussex entry.

PORT ALBERT, B.C. (CP) - William Harold Nelson, 18, one of four young persons charged with offering an indignity to a human body, was sentenced Thursday to two years less a day definite and two years less a day indefinite.

Alma Doreen Lochner, 19, and David Windsor Ferguson, 19, are scheduled to appear in police court today on similar charges.

Another girl, 17-year-old Jean Gibson, was remanded to Oct. 18.

Nelson was convicted following the removal of a body from the pauper's grave in a cemetery in neighboring Albert Sept. 23.

The body buried about two months, was dug up and dragged with logging chains behind a car.

### May Get Million From 44-Year-Old Act Of Kindness

BEAUMONT, Tex. (AP) - An eight-year-old girl is in line to receive an estimated \$1,800,000 because her grandfather bequeathed a new home to Beaumont 44 years ago.

But she won't start getting it for 17 years.

Edith Diane Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Brown Jr. of Beaumont, Thursday was disclosed as the principal beneficiary of a \$2,237,307 estate left by Mrs. Edith Marshall, widow of oil refinery executive Courtney Marshall.

The girl's grandfather, R. L. Brown Sr., said he employed Mrs. Marshall with his insurance firm when she came to Beaumont in 1912. Brown said Mrs. Marshall may have been distantly related to him but that fact was never ascertained.

Brown said he "practically raised" Mrs. Marshall, and that it was apparently out of gratitude to him that she left the majority of her estate to "the favorite granddaughter of the family."

Less than a year ago, Brown gave a very interesting and instructive address on his visit as one of Canada's representatives to the United States, studying on behalf of the meeting.

The meeting closed with the benediction pronounced by Rev. Mr. Sproule, and the singing of the "Queen."

### Swift Company Signs Contract

TORONTO (CP) - Swift Canadian Company Ltd. announced Thursday it has signed a 20-month national contract with the United Packinghouse Workers of America (U.P.W.A.).

It provides a nine-cent hourly wage increase for some 3,000 workers in six meat packing plants across the country and an additional two cents an hour for night work, both retroactive to Aug. 1. A further five-cent increase is effective Aug. 1, 1957.

Previous base rate for workers in Toronto was \$1.66 per hour. In Winnipeg, Calgary and Moncton it has been \$1.43, and in New Westminster, B.C., \$1.47.
