We hope to see the public meeting, to be held under the auspices of the Dairyman's Association, well attended.

The Exhibition To-morrow.

Weather permitting, the Exhibition which will be opened to-morrow will be the most successful ever held in Charlottetown.

Up to noon, the entries comprised sixty-three in the carriage horse class, fifty-six in the draft horse class, twenty Barrister colts and fillies, ninety head in the cattle class, one hundred and seventy-seven in the sheep class, forty-nine in that of the pigs and fifty-three in that of poultry.

The Meeting Last Evening.

The meeting was held in the Hall of the Benevolent Irish Society, and the audience was small. Addresses on behalf of the Scott Act were delivered by the Rev. John Nicholls, Montreal, who is now visiting the city; by the Rev. W. O'Meara, Curate of St. Paul's, by Mr. P. R. Bowers, and by the Hon. David Laird, and by Rev. S. G. Lawson.

Mr. C—Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have listened to Mr. B—owers for about three quarters of (his) hour; and I think with all deference that there is something radically wrong (applause). I am a citizen of Charlottetown (pause). Twenty-two summers have passed over my cranium; and I think I have scooped in as much sense as most men of my age (laughter). It is all very fine—(pause)—this working of the Scott Act (hic).

(The Chair interferred, and thought this thing had gone far enough.) Well, Mr. Chairman, I'll set down—soon—long pause—I go for prohibition or nothing else (laughter). We can't import liquor and make no use of it (laughter).

We have been at the greater pains to report this speech because it is the first and only one which has yet been delivered from the opposite side!

A Great Bear Catcher and Some of His Exploits.

An EXAMINER reporter had an interview to-day with Mr. Sellick, the famous bear trapper and the hero of a hundred valiant contests in the forest primeval of New Brunswick. Mr. Sellick, it may be remarked, is a native of this Province, which, no doubt, accounts for his great success.

Bruin was very savage, and, when the hunter first came upon him, gashed his teeth and metaphorically tore his hair in a way that would make any person with less courage quail with terror. To detail the various hardships encountered by the veteran hunter in eating for his valuable prize and getting it through the forest to the line of railway, would fill a small book. Work of the Church.

On the 2nd inst., a meeting was held in the Long Creek School House, to consider the possibility of building a church for the use of the members of the Church of England in Lot 65. The Rev. T. W. Johnston presided. The subject was thoroughly discussed and look at in all its bearings.

The comparatively few church people in Lot 65; the commodious and neat buildings of other denominations; the great need for a suitable building in which to worship God after the pure faith of our forefathers; and the kind words of encouragement from friends and well-wishers were all taken into consideration, and all present evincing such a warm interest in the undertaking, and an evident determination to carry it to a successful issue. It was unanimously resolved that efforts be at once made to build a church, and a committee be forthwith appointed to take the preliminary steps.

The following Committee were accordingly selected:—Rev. T. W. Johnston, Capt. Turner, William Stretch, Capt. Ball, W. P. Hodgson, Chadwick Stretch, Edward Lowrie, Joseph Stretch, Jr., Joseph Stretch, Sr., Esq., and Rev. T. W. Johnston were appointed Treasurers, to whom contributions and donations for the above object may be sent.

By the last census it was found that there were seventy members of the Church of England in Lot 65. Many who were formerly members of the Church have been receiving the ministrations of religion from the ministers of other denominations, but have been longing and hoping for the time—hoping almost against hope—when they might enjoy the blessed privileges that the Church affords in her ministry and sacraments. It is, therefore, confidently anticipated that all who are in the enjoyment of these inestimable blessings, will assist cheerfully and liberally the laudable efforts of the church people of Lot 65.—Com.

What Has it Done?

SIR,—What has the Scott Act done? Let me show the inquirer what it has done. It has compelled the illicit vendors of liquor to adopt signs, passwords and innumerable tricks to avoid detection. It has put a stigma on the business which may deter many from engaging in it, and many more from drinking habits. It has actually reduced the bulk of crime, brought up year by year, in the police court, to half the former proportions. I have compared the result of three years under each system, and here give the result. Take the returns of our Police Court from 77 to 79, inclusive. In these years there were up for trial for drunkenness: 1877, 729; 1878, 370; 1879, 235—1334. Sent up to Supreme Court: 1877, 18; 1878, 10; 1879, 8—total, 36. In the years 1881, 1882, 1883 there were up for same offences: 1881 (drunk), 193; 1882, 218; 1883, 250—Total, 661. Sent to Supreme Court: 1881, 2; 1882, 3; 1883, 13—Total, 18.

Now, I put it to every sober citizen if this is not something to be thankful for. Can we allow an instrument that has done so much good to be taken out of our hands at the bidding of the rousellers? Will the peace-loving citizens of Charlottetown allow themselves to be deceived? Let us have your votes, then. If you stay at home on the 16th, you virtually vote for the enemy.
