The issue was not explained. It was generally agreed, however, that the main point of difference was the old Red demand for the withdrawal of all foreign troops before peace could come to Korea.

Each side may agree to a "limited" withdrawal of forces now in Korea. For example, if the U.N. withdrew 10,000 soldiers, so would the Communists.

Wants Exchange Of Veterans

ROME, July 18 (AP) - Senator Brian McMahon (Dem-Can) proposed tonight an exchange of visits by Allied and Russian war veterans as a means to promote peace. McMahon noted in a speech prepared for the international federation of war veterans organizations that Russia had until now answered an invitation for its war veterans to attend the conference.

The conference is attended by representatives from 18 countries in North America, Europe and Asia. Canadian observers are Judge Frank McDonagh of Toronto, representing the Canadian Pensioners' Association, and Maj. A. J. Wickens of Moose Jaw, Sask. of the army, navy and air force veterans.

Entertainment en route was provided in two specially equipped cars which included a piano and motion picture projector. The children were taken care of with picture books, puzzles and toys. Bridge and bingo were among the more popular pastimes for the older passengers. Those who are returning on the same train will leave this Province on August 10th, giving them a little over three weeks to renew old acquaintances in this Province.

Alberta Oil Taking On Importance In London

LONDON, July 18 (CP) - The Daily Mail today hails Alberta as the "oil Klondike" of the Commonwealth, with unlimited reserves to meet future needs of the western world.

The province, the paper says in an article from a staff correspondent who toured the fields, ultimately will be capable of making good any loss of supplies arising from the Iranian crisis. Alberta, he says, would like to see Britain get her full share of the riches from the Prairies, and would welcome greater investment of British capital in future programs of development.

"It is a pity," some of the Persians are not with me here in Alberta," the correspondent writes. "Perhaps if they were they would realize that one day they may have to peddle their oil for pennies, because this is where most of the Commonwealth's and western world's oil is going to come from."

Simultaneously, reports were published here that British interests are contemplating heavy investments in Alberta to offset losses expected in Iran. Spokesmen for the major oil interests in London declined to confirm that such a move is under consideration. It could not be done, they said, without the Treasury's consent to a heavy transfer of dollars.

Britain To Buy B. C. Salmon

VANCOUVER, July 18 (CP) - Sale of almost half of British Columbia's 1951 estimated salmon pack was assured today with the London announcement that Britain will buy \$6,000,000 worth.

The deal was concluded today with British Food Ministry and representatives of Salmon Cannermen's Operating Committee of Vancouver. Last year B. C. exported 960,000 cases of canned salmon to 42 countries, of which 427,000 went to Britain.

Teachers Taking Refresher Course

FREDERICTON, July 18 - A group of six high school Latin teachers from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island have gathered at the University of New Brunswick for a two-week refresher course in their subject. The course is being given by Prof. R.E.D. Cattle, head of the University of New Brunswick classics department, under the sponsorship of the Department of Education, and will conclude July 28.

It is designed to help in the introduction into New Brunswick schools of new texts in Latin. In addition to those registered for the course more than a dozen teachers who are attending the regular U.N.B. Teachers' College Summer School in session here, are sitting in on the refresher lectures when their time tables permit.

Two New Dioceses Made In Quebec

VATICAN CITY, July 18 (CP) - The Pope today created two new Roman Catholic dioceses in the Province of Quebec.

Mgr. Bruno Desrochers, Chancellor of the Archbishopric of Quebec, was named Bishop of the newly-created diocese of Ste. Anne De La Pocatiere.

The other new diocese is that of St. Jerome consisting of an area detached from the dioceses of Montreal, Ottawa and Mont Laurier. It will be under Mgr. Emil Penette, Superior of St. Joseph's Seminary, Quebec City, who has been named bishop.

Creation of the diocese were announced previously by church officials in Ottawa.

Emigrant Dislikes Labor Treatment

BONN, Germany, July 18 (CP) - A German emigrant in Canada, in a letter published today in Die Welt, leading West German newspaper, said work given emigrants is "of the lowest and dirtiest kind."

Unwe Schuster, writing from Winnipeg, said he was attracted to Canada two months ago by promises of jobs for farmhands at \$100 to \$130 a month and up to \$320 for specialists.

In actual practice, he said, things did not work out that way. The specialist was sent to a farm where as a farmworker "he is supposed to get \$120."

For half of this," Schuster wrote, "he gets an old job along with bad food and miserable living quarters. And for that he must work from four in the morning until nine at night."

Car Accident Near Montague

An almost serious accident occurred last evening about 7:00 p.m. when a car travelling from Georgetown towards Montague drove into a deep excavation on the road, and turned over landing on the hood, the four wheels up in the air. The driver and three occupants were unhurt, although shaken up.

During the past week the County Construction Company has been excavating a part of the new highway to Georgetown which had insufficient rock fill. The spot, about three miles from Georgetown, runs through a swamp section, and it was feared that the section might break up. An excavation of about 60 yards and six feet deep had been made in the right side of the pavement, coming from Georgetown. The car was proceeding slowly, but owing to the setting sun, the driver was unable to see the deep hole in the road. The doors of the car were flung open, and the occupants were able to extricate themselves without difficulty. The accident was investigated by the local detachment of the R. C. M. P. after which the car was removed.
