AN EXTRAORDINARY ACCIDENT.—An extraordinary accident happened to the barque British America while in dock at Hantsport, N. S., on Wednesday. The vessel was being towed up the river. In tearing of old planks about the topsides, the chain plates were removed, consequently no support was left to the masts which, with the yards, were all in place. The tide had receded one hundred feet from the ship when, without warning, she listed. The fore and main masts, with all attached, went by the deck, carrying the mizzen topmast with an awful crash. The most astonishing thing is that, while men were working on the ship and on the staging around her, not one was injured. The loss to the owners will be about \$4,000.

AT THE CONVENTS.—The annual examination of the classes in St. Joseph's Convent was held yesterday, the pupils acquitting themselves in the usual excellent manner. Among those present were Archbishop O'Brien, Bishop Sweeney, of St. John; Bishop McIntyre, Rev. J. C. McDonald, Rev. John Macdonald, Rev. A. J. McIntyre, the Cathedral staff, D. Montgomery, Superintendent of Education; John McSwain, Principal of the Model School, and E. Roche, Provincial Librarian.

Some of the classes in the Convent de Notre Dame were examined to-day, in the presence of Bishop McIntyre and the Cathedral staff. The pupils, as usual, acquitted themselves well.

The pupils of St. Anne's Convent were examined on Wednesday, in the presence of the clergy and some other visitors, with the usual satisfactory results.

NOVA SCOTIA WINS

The Inter-Provincial Trophy.

St. John, N. B., June 13. The fourth annual inter-Provincial rifle match was fired yesterday at Drury Range. The weather was not such as marksmen like to see. A treacherous wind prevailed throughout the day. It was a left front wind, very puffy, and made good shooting almost impossible. The match was shot at 200, 500 and 600 yards, with Martini-Heintz rifles. The Nova Scotians won with 658 points, New Brunswick second with 593, and P. E. Island a close third with 588. At the close the victors were enthusiastically cheered, as were the Island men. Cheers were given by the victors for the New Brunswick team.

Horses For the Railway.

Ottawa, June 13. O'Neil, one of the contractors for the Annapolis & Digby Railway, passed through Ottawa to-day with about thirty horses which he had purchased in Toronto for carrying on his railway construction. Owing to the refusal of bonding privileges by the United States authorities he was unable to ship them via the Short Line from Montreal to St. John, as he intended doing.

A Point to be Raised.

Ottawa, June 13. It is stated that one point which will be raised by the Toronto Mail's counsel in the libel suit as to the constitutionality of the Incorporation Act, will be that the Lieut.-Governor, who gave assent, has never been legally sworn in to office. It is alleged that the portion of the oath renouncing allegiance to foreign prince and potentate, etc., was omitted when the oath was administered.

An Evangelist Drowned.

Ontario, June 13. Lord Cecil, the noted Evangelist, was drowned at Adolphustown last night, being out in a boat when the craft upset. His body was recovered to-day. Lord Cecil was 48 years of age, and a most devoted Christian and Evangelist of the Plymouth Brethren Order. He was a son of the late Marquis of Exeter, and intended returning to England this autumn.

Government's Policy Endorsed.

Montreal, June 13. R. White, M. P., Cardwell, returned from his constituency to-day. At an annual meeting of the Conservative Association the policy of the Dominion Government was endorsed. Mr. White says the anti-Jesuit agitation exclusive by the work of the pulpit rather than an Orange movement.

Arrested for Smuggling.

Montreal, June 13. Capt. P. Blovin, of the Flying Cloud, has been arrested here for smuggling. He was let out on bail of \$800, and of course the vessel will be confiscated. The same man was master of the Anna Maria, seized and confiscated at Ingonish, C. B., in November, 1878.

The Halifax in the Mud.

Boston, June 13. The str Halifax, Capt. Hill, from Halifax with passengers and merchandise got stuck in the mud in ten feet of water while entering her berth at Lewis' Wharf late this afternoon. She can safely go into her berth at high water.

Dr. Hole Resigns.

Halifax, June 13. Rev. Dr. Hole has resigned the rectorship of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and has been voted a bonus of \$2,000 and a three months' salary. His removal from Nova Scotia will be greatly regretted.

St. Paul, Minn., June 13. A telegram received by Gov. Merceam at 5.30 this morning containing the intelligence that the Chippewa Indians in the vicinity of Mille Lacs Lake are at work butchering inoffensive settlers.

Millers Moving.

Ottawa, June 13. The Maritime Provinces may be prepared to stand from under on the 10th prox., as the western millers have called a convention for that date.

Halifax, June 13. The Rev. D. C. Moore has been re-elected Grand Master Mason of Nova Scotia, and Hon. Wm. Ross Grand Secretary, Kingston.

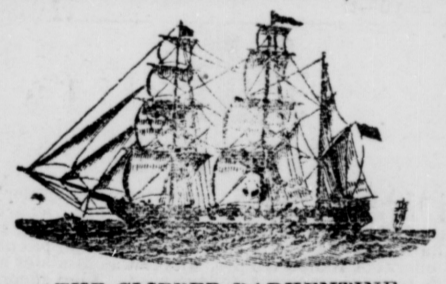
