Minister Considers Hosp. Union Request

SUMMERSIDE - Replying to the statement made by Edward McNicolas, Union representative, P.E.I. Hospital, Labor Minister Henry Wedge said "the same situation exists in all provinces and some day soon someone is going to have to decide who owns these hospitals." The statement made by Mr. McNicolas was that the government had estimated that union demands would cost some \$1,000,000 but he said that it would only cost \$160,000 for each hospital.

Mr. Wedge also noted that the wages now paid are on a similar scale to those paid to government employees in its institutions. If wages are increased to one group, it would also mean that a similar increase would go to the government. Mr. Wedge said that he felt that some of the demands were unfair, as under them a maid could be getting almost as much as a stenographer. He said that a reply to the request for a strike vote was being held up pending an investigation to determine if the employees involved are "essential" in which event no strike would be allowed. Regardless of these considerations, the unions will be given a reply this week, Mr. Wedge said.

Michael Lunt Wins British Amateur Title

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) - Michael Lunt, 26-year-old British amateur executive and British Walker Cup player, won the 66th British amateur golf championship Saturday, defeating an irrepressible Salsbery named John Blackwell 2 and 1.

The 36-hole final was played in brilliant sunshine before a gallery of less than 1,000 people. As the original 39 Americans in the championships drifted away, Lunt and Blackwell managed to make a match of it against his younger opponent. In the morning's 18-hole round, Blackwell amazed everyone by holding Lunt even. Both went out in a ragged 41 and Blackwell had the better approximate medal round with a 78 while Lunt's was 80. The afternoon was a different story. Lunt went three up on a 36-hole hole-in-one. He enjoyed his advantage to the conclusive 2 and 1 triumph.

Employers In The Province Of P.E.I.

Following is a copy of an approved order issued under authority of the Act respecting a minimum wage for men. AN ACT RESPECTING A MINIMUM WAGE FOR MEN APPROVAL OF ORDER

Approved by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council by Minute-in-Council No. 318/68 on the 15th day of May 1963.

In conformity with Section 7 of An Act Respecting a Minimum Wage for Men (R. 218) (1960) the Council did and do hereby approve the following Order made by the Labour Relations Board (Prince Edward Island) in connection with a minimum wage for men:

1. Definitions: The terms "employee", "employer" and "wage" shall have the meanings set out in the "Act Respecting a Minimum Wage for Men". "Processing Plant" or "Food Processing Plant" means any factory, business, or establishment for the adapting or processing of fish, or other products of the sea, or fruits, or vegetables, or the by-products thereof, or for the canning or packaging of such fish or sea products, fruits or vegetables when adapted or processed.

Application: This Order shall apply to all employers, and to all employees except those hereinafter specifically referred to and excluded.

2. Exemptions: This Order shall not apply to the following: (a) any person employed in farming and fishing, (b) any person employed in the grading, bagging or packaging of potatoes on farm premises, (c) students employed during the school term, and outside regular school hours, (d) any person under the age of 21 years, (e) any person whose wages are fixed and established under a labor-management contract signed and approved under the Trade Union Act, or the Industrial Relations Act, existing in and in force at the date of this Order, (f) any person eligible for membership in the Civil Servants Association, (g) registered apprentices.

3. Minimum Wage: The Minimum Wage fixed by this Order to be paid by any employer to any employee to whom the provisions hereof apply shall be ninety cents (90¢) per hour effective on the date of the publication of this Order in the Royal Gazette, ninety-five cents (95¢) per hour, effective November 1st, 1963, and One Dollar (\$1.00) per hour effective May 1st, 1964.

4. Processing Plants: Notwithstanding the provisions of the paragraph 4 hereof, the minimum wage fixed by this Order to be paid by any employer to any employee of a food processing plant shall be eighty cents (80¢) per hour.

5. Handicapped Employees: Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 4 hereof, any employee to whom financial assistance in compensation for, or by reason of, physical disability, which shall physical disability prevents such employee from being employed full time, or otherwise carrying out a full and normal day's work, and to whom the provisions of this Order apply, shall be exempt from such wages, which, together with the amount of such assistance, shall be equivalent to and total the minimum hourly wage herein established.

6. Probationary Period: Except in the case of seasonal or casual employees, the provisions of paragraph 4 hereof shall apply and become effective fifty calendar days from the date of hiring.

7. Working Time: All time required by the employer to be spent by the employee either at work or awaiting or available for work, whether on the premises of the employer or elsewhere as directed by him, shall be counted as time worked, and any part of an hour so spent shall be paid for at the full hourly rate.

The General Order made by the Labour Relations Board (Prince Edward Island) and approved by Minute-in-Council No. 383/62 dated the 13th day of August, 1962, is hereby rescinded.

Employers are herewith advised that the above was published in the Royal Gazette on May 25th, 1963, and therefore became effective on that date.
