Queen Mother Sails From New York For Home After North America Conquest

NEW YORK (CP)—Queen Mother Elizabeth, who in three short weeks won the hearts of Americans and Canadians who saw her, sailed for home Thursday after what already is being labelled as the most successful royal tour in history.

Time and geography made it difficult to compare the Queen Mother's short visit to New York, Washington, Williamsburg, Va., and Ottawa with the 1939 royal tour when she and the late King George VI made a coast-to-coast two-month visit to Canada, with a side trip to the United States.

LIVERPOOL, Eng., (Reuters)—Prime Minister Churchill's Conservatives scored an important political success in a parliamentary by-election here Thursday by retaining the marginal constituency of West Derby with an increased majority.

John Woolam, Conservative, polled 21,158 votes; Cyril Fenton, Labor, 18,650. Woolam, 27, a lawyer, becomes the youngest member of Parliament. His majority of 2,508 was higher than the Conservative majority of 1,707 in the 1953 general election.

The vacancy was caused by the elevation to the peerage of Sir David Maxwell Fyfe, now Lord Kilmauir.

Government supporters considered their increased majority in this constituency a favorable omen for the general election expected sometime next year. The Conservatives now have contested 40 by-elections since Churchill returned to power in 1951 without losing a seat that they held at the general election.

A government defeat at West Derby would have been a major setback at a time when its supporters believe Conservative stock is rising in the country as a whole. The standing of the 625-seat

Air Cadet League Drafts Plans

OTTAWA (CP)—Top officers of the Air Cadet League of Canada and the RCAF met here Thursday to draft plans for the league's work next year.

The league's national executive committee under the chairmanship of H. Darroch Macgillivray of St. John's, Nfld., conferred with Air Marshal Roy Slemon, chief of the air staff, and other RCAF officers.

Number of cadet squadrons has increased to 265, a jump of 20 in the last year, and the meeting studied possible expansion of the league's special activities program including summer camps at RCAF stations, free flying courses, leadership training and goodwill exchange tours to the United States and Europe.

British House of Commons Approves Paris Agreements On German Arms

LONDON (AP)—The House of Commons Thursday night by a vote of 264 to 4 approved the Paris agreements for the rearmament of Germany for Western defence. Under parliamentary procedure the vote assured that the pact will be ratified automatically by Britain, but the formalities must await 21 working days of Parliament.

In the two-day debate that preceded the vote Prime Minister Churchill told Labor questioners it would be a mistake to mix the process of ratification with talks with the Russians. "I cannot think of anything that would be worse," he said.

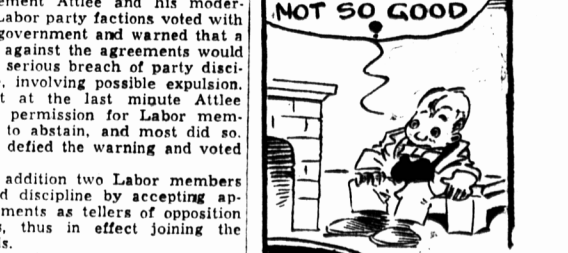

Injured Boy Is Recovering

TORONTO (CP)—Nine-year-old Iggy Crotty successfully underwent an operation to remove a blood clot, the Sick Children's Hospital said Thursday.
