115th Anniversary Service At Baptist Church

In observance of the 115th anniversary of the founding of the Charlottetown Baptist Church, a special program has been planned for Sunday, October 21st, when Dr. Arthur C. Vincent, pastor of the Main Street Baptist Church in Saint John, N. B. will speak at both services.

An early church history records the forming of the church as follows: Rev. George McDonald by request organized the church in August, 1836. Brother Thomas DesBrisay was set apart as deacon. There were nine members: Thomas DesBrisay, John Uhlman, William Bain, James Caffray, Isaac Jackson, Jane Lallow, Christina C. Bagnall, Nancy Reid and Isabella Mitchell.

First Church Building The first house of worship erected by the group was opened in 1845 and stood on a corner of Upper Prince and Euston Streets. In 1853 the building was moved to a site on Great George St., not far from the building housing the present Customs Office. In 1879, a large modern church home, built of brick and octagonal in shape, was opened on a corner of Prince and Fitzroy Streets.

Sept. Exports Of Roughwood Show Further Increase

Another heavy increase in shipments of roughwood over the same month of last year highlighted the exports from this Province via the C. N. R. Borden-Cape Tormentine route. The figures for September released through the office of the Superintendent here show that there were 376 carloads of roughwood shipped last month compared to only 11 carloads in September 1950.

The total number of carloads shipped from the Province last month was 739, while a year ago there were 435. Imports were down considerably with 1,186 carloads arriving last month compared to 1,579 a year ago.

Among the imports the biggest drop was in coal shipments with 166 this year and 289 last year. Other principal imports with the figures for this September and for the same month last year in brackets were: Autos 30 (62); Flour and Feed 17 (20); Gas and Oil 187 (173); Lime 22 (20); Lumber 35 (67); Less Carloads 239 (326); Sugar 16 (18); Miscellaneous 90 (135); Canned goods 29 (51); Sandstone and gravel 46 (79); Shingles and Roofing 23 (0); Vegetables 5 (0).

Important items crossing from Borden to Tormentine were: Empty barrels 6 (1); Eggs 4 (12); Fish 8 (6); Livestock 92 (107); Less Carloads 21 (13); Potatoes 14 (33); Starch 8 (0); Turnips 66 (84); Moss 10 (5); Lumber 8 (5); Blueberries 2 (7); Scrap 18 (9).

Of the roughwood shipped from here last month there were 39 carloads originated at points between Charlottetown and Summerside and Borden. The biggest movement of 195 cars originated at points east and south of the capital, with the balance of 145 carloads coming from west of Summerside.

As usual the great volume of traffic coming to the Province via the ferry route was destined to the central area with 968 carloads consigned to points between Borden, Summerside and Charlottetown. 130 carloads went to the section east and south of the city with the balance of 30 cars going west of Summerside.

Plumbing Regulations Discussed At Meeting

Fifteen local plumbing and heating contractors attended a meeting held in The Charlottetown last night under the auspices of the National Association of Plumbing and Heating Contractors. Addressing the meeting were Harold Peer, Saint John, N. B., National President of the Association, R. Davidson, General Manager, Head Office of the Association, Toronto, and Norman Greenfield, Moncton, Secretary-Treasurer of the New Brunswick Branch. The local chairman was Howard Douglas, and secretary, treasurer, J. Callaghan.

An outline of the objectives of the Association was given by Mr. Peer, who appealed for better regulation of the trade and the public, and stressed the need for plumbing regulations in this Province, comparable with regulations in other provinces, to protect the health of the public. He invited the local membership to attend the national convention to be held at the Algonquin Hotel in Ottawa, Ontario, by the Sea in June, 1952.

Mr. Davidson spoke of the history of the Association, which was formed in 1896 and represents 1500 plumbing and heating contractors from Vancouver to St. John's, Newfoundland, and in the other nine Provinces of Canada. He expressed concern about the lack of protection for public health in this Province, and offered the assistance of the Association in the forming of a branch here.

The conditions in the province of New Brunswick were described by Mr. Greenfield, and he testified to the success of the organizations there. The film, "Water on Tap", prepared by the Canadian Institute of Plumbing and Heating, was then shown. This film, which is beamed at the farm market, will be shown at all theatres across Canada, and is available to any rural organization by application to any local plumbing and heating contractor.

Drop Predicted In Egg Price Levels

WINNIPEG, Oct. 19 (CP) — The general level of egg prices in 1952 will be somewhat lower than in the 1951, but there will be no collapse of the market, W. J. Landreth of Winnipeg, chairman of the Canadian Poultry Council, said yesterday.

He was commenting on a report from British Columbia predicting "chaotic conditions" and imminent collapse in the egg industry. "The immediate likelihood is that egg prices will actually increase somewhat," Mr. Landreth said. "We do not expect a general lowering of prices until the new crop of layers gets into full production some time around Nov. 15."

He disagreed with Herbert Burns, produce manager for Ruters and Company in British Columbia and a director of the Canadian Produce Council, that Canadians would have an unmarketable surplus of 600,000 to 700,000 cases of eggs by the end of the year.

Maritime Institute For Hospital Administrators

Plans commenced almost a year ago are now near completion for the third Maritime Institute for Hospital Administrators, Trustees at Department of Health, under sponsorship of the Maritime Hospital Association. In making this announcement, the Secretary, Mrs. Gladys N. Porter, M.B.E., Kentville, said that a tentative program will soon be distributed to some 100 hospitals in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Nova Scotia.

The Institute will be held November 20-24 at Halifax in the Auditorium of the Victoria General Hospital.

Mrs. Porter said the committee in charge has made special efforts to provide a program of benefit to administrators of both small and large hospitals, and also to their trustees and department heads. Preparing For Winter Roadwork

A start will be made next week on bringing in road machinery to equip it for winter snow-fighting. The machines will not be brought in all at once, but gradually as there is a considerable amount of work involved in fitting them with the plow equipment. Once fitted, however, the machines will be returned to their districts where they may be further used for road work this autumn.

The Department of Public Works and Highways is now experimenting with some new machinery which they have found to be particularly effective in the moving of fill for roads. Since it is estimated that the fill is the biggest single expense item in road building the Department has been searching for ways to do the work at less cost.

Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of the Department, though not describing the process in full because it is still in the experimental stage, nevertheless believes that eventually the new system will cut the fill cost by approximately one-third.

The Department of Public Works and Highways tried satisfactory in last year and found it highly satisfactory in providing a surface which will carry the traffic until such time as full improvements to the roads are made. The Department states it is superior to gravel for several reasons, among them being the fact that it does not corrugate and that it stands up better in the Spring.

Recently similar work was done on the road at Johnson's River and at the present time it is being carried on in several places in King's County.
