Red Squadrons Pass Over Quemoy; Defenders Fire

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Communist planes swooped over Quemoy and touched off a hail of Nationalist anti-aircraft fire Tuesday, straining the Red-proclaimed cease-fire in Formosa Strait. The Nationalist firing was the first since Red China announced a week-long halt in its artillery pounding of the offshore island effective early Monday. No further clashes were reported, and the Nationalists took advantage of the truce to push in more supplies. Eight Communist planes in three formations approached Quemoy, the Nationalist defence ministry said. They streaked over the island, then rained for the mainland with anti-aircraft shells bursting around them.

Gene Kramer reported from Quemoy the Red planes made two passes through a high overcast but did not open fire. Maj.-Gen. I Fuen, Nationalist air force intelligence chief, said both jets and propeller planes may have been involved. This raised speculation the slower propeller craft may have taken photographs while MIG fighters provided cover. The Red flights did not necessarily violate the truce pledge. Peiping's original announcement said only that artillery shelling of Quemoy would be suspended for seven days. One condition, however, was that the United States cease conveying Nationalist supplies to Quemoy. (In Washington, state department press officer Lincoln White

described the flights as provocative.) PLANES LAND Air drops were carried out at Quemoy Monday night and Tuesday. Six Nationalist cargo planes landed in quick succession Tuesday. No supplies came in from the sea. The Communists also were reported busy. About 1,500 laborers were sighted at several mainland points and on the Tan islands repairing gun positions and pill boxes, the Nationalists said. There was widespread speculation here that the U.S. convoy escorts would be withdrawn to induce the Reds to continue the cease-fire beyond the seven-day period. The United States is negotiating with Red China in Warsaw for a permanent cease-fire.

NEW YORK (AP)—Industrialist Cyrus Eaton, who recently held a 95-minute conversation with Soviet Prime Minister Khrushchev, said Tuesday he was convinced that Russia "would go out to the last man in defence of China." By that, he said, he meant that "Russia is back of Communist China completely and fully." He also said he felt strongly that U.S. policy in the Far East is unwise. "I feel we are heading toward disaster," said the Canadian-born Eaton who returned Tuesday with his wife on the liner Queen Elizabeth from a trip to Europe. He held his conversation with Khrushchev Sept. 1.
