

Flagpole Falls, Just Misses Car Carrying Queen And Duke

MAIDENCOMBE, England (Re-tered)—A flagpole 25 feet long topped over during a royal procession Tuesday, just missing an automobile carrying Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh.

It struck another car immediately behind containing members of the royal household. However, no one was injured.

The royal couple were being driven with the top down on the first day of a visit to England's west country, as they passed through Maidencombe, the pole crashed, missing their auto by about 10 feet.

The white pole was set in an old drum filled with sand and was one of half-a-dozen supports for a string of gaily colored bunting.

As the Queen's car passed, people on the pavement pressed forward and it was then that the pole fell.

The driver of the household car braked, but had no chance of avoiding the pole which struck the car first on the hood and the right front fender, smashing an outside driving mirror.

In the car at the time were the Queen's lady-in-waiting, the countess of Leicester; the assistant private secretary, Major Edward Ford, and a secretary, Sgt. Ldr. Christopher Blount.

Sitting in front with the chauffeur was inspector Frank Kelly, the duke's personal police officer.

The duke noticed the falling pole, but apparently seeing that the age was superficial, did not order the royal car to stop.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. PIUS MCGAUGHEY
Christian tradition is based on those words of Christ: "I am the Resurrection and the life: he who believes in me, even if he should die, shall live; and whoever lives and believes in me, he shall never die." Death is a change from life to larger life. It is a birthday. The beginning of our life of glory.

The soul of His servant, Margaret Mary O'Brien, wife of Pius McGaughey, Green Road, Prince Edward Island, entered into her life of glory on March 23rd, 1956. Her death occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Gerald Mitchell, Charlottetown.

Mrs. McGaughey enjoyed excellent health and maintained a very active life, until she was stricken a few months prior to her death. She entered the Charlottetown Hospital in late October, where, upon extensive medical examination, her condition was diagnosed unusual and very serious. Upon the recommendation of her physician, she proceeded to Boston's famed Lahey Clinic for advice and possible remedial treatment by specialists. After further detailed examination and consultation at Lahey Clinic, she was committed for treatment at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Mass. In the beginning, response to treatment seemed favorable, but later it became apparent that relief was very temporary, and all efforts were in vain.

In early February, when all hopes for recovery vanished, she returned to Charlottetown to await with patience and resignation for the fulfillment of God's Holy Will to relieve her from her sufferings.

Throughout her illness she was comforted and her spiritual strength fortified by the rites of the Catholic Church, of which she was a devout member. Her death, though not unexpected, came as a great shock to her husband and family, who were her constant companions during her illness.

Born at Aughaville, County Cork, Ireland, she was the eldest daughter of Mary Brennan and the late Morgan O'Regan. After graduating from Dromore National High School, she immigrated to the U.S.A. where she joined relatives in Massachusetts and was employed consecutively in Boston, Marlborough and Lynn, returning to her home in Ireland, once for an extended visit. During her residence in Lynn, she was an active member of the Young Ladies' Sodality, St. Mary's Church, and also became a promoter for St. Joseph's Union, N.Y., a Catholic Society devoted to the temporal and spiritual care of homeless children, in which capacity she continued until her death.

In 1915 she was married at St. John's Church, Quincy, Mass., and shortly thereafter moved to Green Road, P.E.I. where she resided with her husband until the onset of her illness.

Being of a happy and cheerful disposition and a gracious hostess, she made many friends in her new home and country. She displayed a keen interest in schools and educational systems and in affairs of the nation. She was later, on varying occasions, to travel in five of the provinces. She was an example of Christian motherhood who devoted her life to her home, her family and her church. By her good works and charitable attributes she showed a zeal for the spiritual welfare of others. Because of her ability and willingness to help, she was often called upon by her pastors to perform special duties, to which she applied herself diligently.

For a number of years prior to the building of a mission church in the living room of her home was converted monthly into a chapel, where the priest offered Mass and Communion for everyone, but chiefly for the benefit of the elderly and children of the area. She loved this work and looked upon it as a special privilege. She also served for a time as a Sunday School teacher, and was formerly a member of the C.W.L. At social functions of the church, she was always present with a generous helping hand and will be greatly missed by her fellow workers. She was a lover of art and beauty. In her hobbies these aesthetic characteristics were expressed in her beautiful flower gardens, and in the various forms of needle work at which she excelled.

Besides her sorrowing husband, Pius McGaughey, she leaves to mourn her loss, her mother, Mrs. Mary O'Regan, Cork, Ireland, two daughters, Mary, Mrs. Don McAllister, Grand Falls, N.B., Julia, Mrs. Gerald Mitchell, Charlottetown, one son Morgan, Charlottetown and eleven grand-children. Five brothers also survive, Morgan and John, Quincy, Mass., who attended her funeral, Patrick, Jerry and Timothy in Ireland, three sisters, Hanna, Mrs. P. H. O'Leary and May, Mrs. C. O'Shea, Quincy, Mass., and Ellen, Mrs. Hurley, Cork City, Ireland. Four sisters and two brothers predeceased her.

The funeral was held from the Charlottetown Funeral Home on Monday morning, March 26th, to St. Dunstan's Basilica where Re-

quiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Clarence Roche, who also officiated at the grave. Rev. James Smith, Kelly's Cross, her pastor, was present in the sanctuary. Two grandsons, Morgan and Gerald Mitchell were among the servers at the Mass.

The pall bearers were: Messrs. Peter Carragher, John C. Condon, Harold Donahue, Joseph Flood, Arnold Toole and Charles Toole.

Her remains were laid to rest in the Catholic Cemetery, Charlottetown, there to await reunion with her soul in a glorious resurrection.

Three-year Term On Bogus Cheque Charge
SYDNEY (CP)—James Carleton, who identified himself as an Ontario newspaper man, Monday was sentenced to three years in penitentiary after pleading guilty to obtaining a \$79 typewriter and \$3 in cash with a worthless cheque.

Ten other charges of obtaining money and merchandise under false pretenses laid on information filed by police here in Montreal, Halifax, Amherst and Dartmouth, N. S., drew concurrent terms ranging from three to six months.

University Education To Cost More At Seven Institutions

University education will come at a higher cost this year in at least seven Canadian universities. And increases in at least two more may be announced soon.

A Canadian Press survey shows the increases, blamed by most universities on steadily rising costs, will range from two to more than 11 per cent.

Ten universities have said no increases are planned this year. Memorial University, St. John's, Nfld., said no decision has been reached yet, and Montreal's McGill University said fees will have to be boosted sometime if more money isn't received from other sources.

NO INCREASE
Institutions other than McGill not planning to increase fees this year are University of British Columbia; Queen's University, Kingston, Ont.; University of Montreal; Ottawa University; Mount Allison, Sackville, N.B.; St. Dunstan's, Charlottetown; St. Francis Xavier, Antigonish, N. S.; and Acadia, Wolfville, N. S.

Quebec's Laval University says increases are contemplated, but amounts have not been decided yet.

The University of Alberta fee boost will amount to slightly under five per cent. Officials said its aim is "to bring tuition fees more closely into line with those of other western Canada universities."

RUSSIANS RUN ARMY
VIENNA (Reuters)—The right wing independent newspaper Die Presse says Russia has taken over direct control of the Czech armed forces and that 50 Russian generals and 900 other officers of field rank have been attached to them. The paper shrugs off a denial of their recent report that Russian tank and artillery units are stationed along the Austro-Czech frontier. The paper claims there are 5,000 Russian military experts attached to the Czech forces to instruct and control them. Czech officials, it says, are under control of Russian staff officers so that the Czech army is becoming an integral part of the Soviet forces under the Warsaw Pact.

Strike Looms For Two Lake Shipping Firms

MONTREAL (CP)—The Seafarers' International Union Tuesday told Labor Minister Gregg it is "mechanically impossible" to postpone a strike against two Great Lakes shipping companies pending mediation of a wage dispute.

Hal Banks, Canadian director of the SIU, said in reply to a plea from the minister that the union's committee decided it is "mechanically impossible to prevent the strike," scheduled for noon Thursday.

The union earlier announced the strike plans against N. M. Patterson and Sons Ltd. and Upper Lakes and St. Lawrence Transportation Co. Ltd., two of seven members of the Association of Lake Carriers, currently engaged in contract negotiations with the SIU.

Mr. Banks told a reporter the negotiating committee now is unable to avert the walkout because the union members had decided on the action after a "referendum ballot." Another such ballot, taking "a week or eight days," would be necessary for postponement.
