Discouragement is evident everywhere along the north side of the Province as fishermen survey the shore and realize what it means in the loss of income and possibly markets.

Stanhope. One old-time lobster fisherman said he lost 350 traps and was through fishing for good.

Hundreds Of Traps Lost

At Tracadie there was no damage reported to traps but countless traps were lost and not even washed up on the local beach.

Eastern Damage

From St. John's to the east coast the damage apparently is not so extensive as on the north side of the Province, however, it is far from small.

Western Loss Heavy

Further along the coast at points a few miles south of Alberton the loss of gear was reported almost 100 percent.

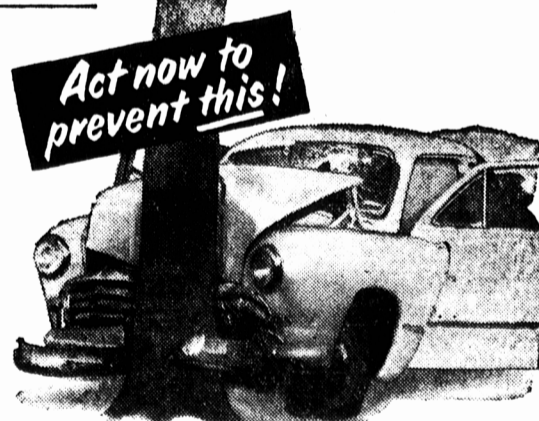

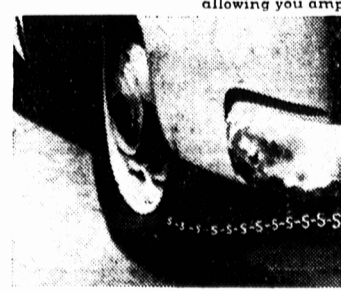
