German Army to be Increased.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—Semi-official papers announce that the German army will be gradually increased by 15,000 men. No cause is assigned for this unexpected move.

Cuban Bonds.

PARIS, Nov. 13.—At a meeting of French holders of Cuban bonds here yesterday, a resolution was adopted to appeal to the "good faith of Spain and the spirit of equity of the United States" to settle the question of their rights as creditors, "in conformity with the rules of justice and law."

Li Goes to the Rear.

PEKIN, Nov. 14.—Li Hung Chong has been ordered to proceed to Tai-Nan, capital of the province of Shan-Tung, to concert measures with the Viceroy of Shan-Tung to prevent future inundations of the Yellow river (Hoang Ho.) This appointment is regarded as virtually shelving Prince Li.

Spain and the Kaiser

LONDON, Nov 14.—A despatch to the Observer, from Berlin, says the German Imperial party will not land at any Spanish port. Owing to Spain's interpretation of the visit as a manifestation of sympathy with Spain in her present difficulty, she will have to forego the pleasure of a formal visit from the kaiser.

The Spanish Situation.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—Among onlookers here the impression exists, though it is not the result of any official statement, that the Spanish peace commissioners will not consent to a treaty which the American commissioners could sign.

It seems almost possible, also, that in the pitiable pressure to which they are subjected between their creditors, who are on the spot watching them, and the stern attitude of the United States, the Spaniards may abandon their struggles and leave the two forces to confront each other.

The Times' Opinion

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The Times in its editorial this morning on the Hispano-American situation, repeats its conviction that "No power will attempt to hinder the transfer of the Philippines."

SCHOONER ASHORE AT ST. PETER'S BAY

She Left Quebec on Friday,

IN TOW OF THE AROGAN WITH FOUR OTHERS.

The John O'Neill Owned in Quebec --The Crew Saved.

Mr STEWART, Nov. 15.—The schooner John O'Neill, which left Quebec in company with the schooners David Wallace, Verona and Cambden, in tow of the steamer Arogan, in connection with the firm of the Atlantic Transportation Co., of Quebec, with the other schooners broke adrift from their tow at 4 o'clock on Friday the 11th inst.

This schooner the John O'Neill drifted until Saturday night when P. E. I. was sighted.

Notwithstanding the hazardous task of the crew the vessel went ashore on the south side of St. Peter's harbor, near Mr. Clark's lobster factory.

The captain and crew are all saved.

Their names are: Capt Charles Balles New York State; Mate, Norman McInnis Cape Breton; Steward, Jos Nicholl, Detroit Mich; Seamen, A. B. Hubbe, of Duluth, Minn; Martin Coyle, Pt. Huron, Mich; John Wallinder, Cardiff, Wales; and A. Frenchman who was shipped at Quebec. The captain and crew are at Mount Stewart awaiting orders and the pleasure of the American Consul.

The French Warships.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The Daily Mail says this morning that the French naval construction programme for 1899 includes two battleships of 14,500 tons each, with very powerful armament and protection, two cruisers of 4,000 tons each, two large torpedo boat destroyers, and 11 torpedo boats.
