YOUTH PLEAD GUILTY — Strong condemnation of slot machines, pool rooms and card rooms as a major factor in the cause of juvenile crime was made in Summerside Police Court by a Summerside lawyer, W. Chester MacDonald, during the trial earlier this week of two youths, 15 and 17 years of age, who pleaded guilty to two charges of breaking, entering and theft. The two were each given a one-year suspended sentence by Magistrate E. H. Strong, Q.C., who also ordered the parents to post bonds of \$2,000, as recognition that their boys will keep the peace and be of good behavior. Further conditions of the suspended sentence requires the boys to be at their homes before 10 p.m. every night, to attend church each Sunday, to report to the Chief of Police each month, and to make restitution of all money taken in the two breaks. One of the breaks was at a pool room where \$3.00 was taken, and the other at a small store where \$110, as taken from a cigarette vending machine.

Side Board Of Trade Discusses Many Subjects —With president John Mungall presiding, the Summerside Board of Trade met for the regular monthly meeting in the Court House on Thursday night and with a good attendance of the members discussed a large number of subjects of interest to the community. Reports were received from the various standing committees. It was reported that the annual government grant of \$200.00 to the Tourist Bureau at Read's Corner had been granted again this year and the tourist committee was instructed to investigate whether or not the grant from the town of Summerside will be made this year.

The president, Mr. Mungall, said that since the last meeting the committee on unemployment had met and held a panel discussion over the air. He said he believed that this discussion had had beneficial results and he believed that plans now being made to endeavor to relieve the unemployment situation should be of a long range nature, that such plans should provide for this distant future as well as the present.

Secretary Harold Rodd read a letter from the president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce announcing that the school for Board of Trade secretaries would be held at MacMasters University, Hamilton, Ontario beginning on May 29th. Mr. Rodd said that he would be unable to attend the course this year but stated that due to the great value of the course it would be a matter of regret if someone from the local board did not go to take advantage of it.

The existing by-laws of the board are at present up for revision and at the next meeting of the board notice of motion will be given to amend some of them with a view of bringing them up to date.

Mr. John S. Wright of the industrial development committee reported that he had attended a meeting with the government regarding the matter of having Summerside made a port of call.

Mr. George Meikle drew the attention of the board to the lack of traffic signals on the highway at Bedouque and at the Dunk River bridge. He suggested that at the point where the roads meet at Bedouque that a merging traffic sign should be put up and also a directional arrow sign at the Dunk River bridge. Several of the members spoke in support of Mr. Meikle's suggestions and the president directed that the matter be taken care of by the committee concerned.

Various other matters such as daylight saving time, local power failures, standardization of traffic signals on the highway were discussed and left in the hands of the various committees to investigate.

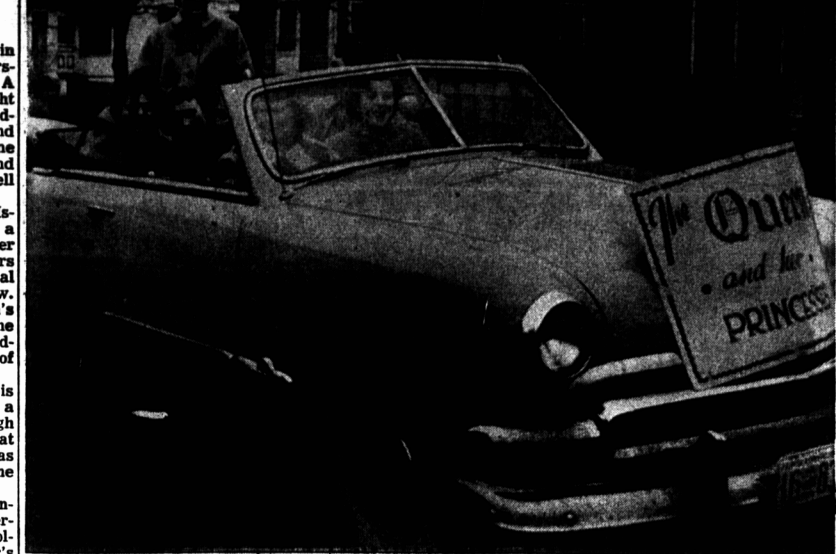

Side Officer Takes Part In Survival Test Flying Officer J. M. Arsenault of Summerside was among nine R.C.A.F. officers who spent a sub-zero 10-day period in the Alberta bush proving that R.C.A.F. emergency rations and equipment will keep a man alive and well. During their stay in the bush temperatures ranged as low as 33 degrees below zero and although each man lost an average of 11 pounds, all came through the ordeal safe and sound. The 10-day stay under Arctic conditions allowed for considerable ingenuity among the officers. One of them found that coffee boiled in the metal food pack, had an unpleasant taste. Calling upon his school day chemistry lessons, he added charcoal and rectified the coffee. Another fashioned a fish hook from a metal eyelid in his seat pack, made a line from his parachute shroud and using as bait a small piece of red flannel from a label, he actually caught a large fish through a hole in the ice which he had cut by fastening the service clasp knife to a pole.



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Thousands Of Pilgrims March In Old Jerusalem

THOUSANDS OF PILGRIMS OF JERUSALEM, (AP)— Christian pilgrims of many nations Friday marched on the way of the cross through the cobblestoned streets of old Jerusalem. The Good Friday procession, followed the path along which Jesus Christ carried his cross to Calvary. More than 5,000 pilgrims took part. The group was divided according to languages. Preceding each unit was a huge wooden cross carried by 15 men. The procession began inside the courtyard of the Moslem secondary school near St. Stephen's gate and moved along to the church of the Holy Sepulchre.

SERMONS PREACHED The first station on the way was on the spot where Christ was tried before Pontius Pilate. The route is marked by 14 other stations where incidents occurred during Christ's walk to his death. Although he was crucified outside the city wall, changes in Jerusalem since then have enclosed

per cent, received the first polio inoculation and a large number in Summerside. Dr. O. H. As in other types of inoculations, it takes some time after the last inoculation for the body to build up protection.
