A STRIKING DIFFERENCE.

THE excuses which are made to defend the Government School appointments are very hollow. The Government papers generally have been very silent as to the reasons for Mr. Montgomery's dismissal...

Mr. Montgomery is a good teacher, but having had no experience in a Normal School, is dismissed.

Mr. Manning is a good teacher, but having had no experience as a Superintendent of Education, is appointed to that office.

The reason which prevails to dismiss Mr. Montgomery does not prevail to prevent Mr. Manning's appointment.

Why then this striking difference? Why is one of our own young men, born and educated among us, one who, by quiet and consistent discharge of duty, had already won the respect of all who knew him and his work...

If Mr. Montgomery had to be dismissed from the Normal School, why has he not made Superintendent of Education? He has every qualification for that office that Mr. Manning has, except one.

[Since writing the above we have been informed by the Commissioner of Public Works that Mr. W. D. Stewart, has resigned his Trusteeship of the Protestant Academy. But the Commissioner Public Works, strangely enough, forgot to tell us that Mr. W. D. Stewart's resignation has not been accepted!

MR. W. E. DAWSON'S EXACT POSITION.

There is a large brick school at the north of the town. This is Methodist property. Of this property Mr. Dawson was, and is, a Trustee. By him and his Co-Trustees this property was leased to the Trustees of the "Protestant Academy,"—two of whom are Mr. W. Stewart and Dr. Johnson.

SUPREME COURT, GEORGETOWN

WEDNESDAY, July 17. The July Term of the Supreme Court commenced its sittings at Georgetown yesterday. His Honor Judge Peter presiding.

The Queen at the prosecution of Malcolm McCallum v. Archd. McNeil, for shooting at the prosecutor with a rifle.

The Court in charging the Grand Jury in these cases, went very fully into the law with regard to the use of deadly weapons, and showed that persons are only justified in their use for the purpose of preventing a felonious act; and, then, only as a last resource—and not in any case for the purpose of ejecting a trespasser.

Edwin E. Dukie v. Archd. McNeill. The Venue in this case changed to Queen's County.

Benjamin Lyman and others v. Thomas B. Hall. This was an action on a Promissory note. Verdict for the plaintiff for the sum of \$338.94.

Merchants' Bank of Halifax v. Thomas B. Hall. Settled by cognovit. Mr. Sullivan for plaintiff. Mr. McLennan for the defendant.

Theodore Moore v. the Citizens' Insurance Company. Judgment confessed for the plaintiff for the sum of \$666.75. Mr. McLeod for plaintiff. Mr. Davies for defendant.

Hugh L. McDonald v. Joseph Livingstone. Referred. Mr. McLeod for plaintiff. Mr. Longworth for defendant.

Donald McKenzie and another v. Samuel Burge and another. Action on a Promissory Note. Verdict for the plaintiff for the sum of \$78.58, subject to a point of law taken by the defendant's Attorney, viz: that the plaintiffs had not shown that they had registered a certificate of partnership in accordance with the statute.

Louis W. G. Hayden v. the Stadacona Insurance Company. This was an action brought for the purpose of recovering the sum of \$ , being the amount covered by a policy of insurance granted by the plaintiffs, and which they contest on the ground of fraud, and that the conditions of the policy had not been fulfilled.

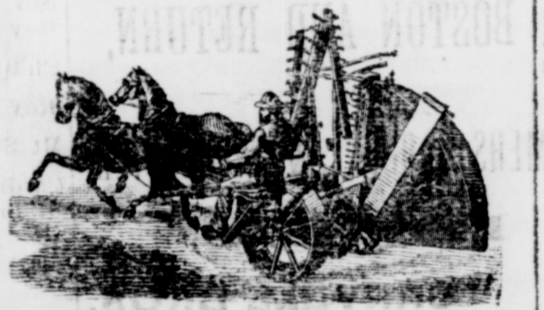
