NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.
LONDON, Aug. 2- 5 p. m.
At 2.30 o'clock this afternoon Mr. Gladstone's condition was unchanged. Feverish state continues. Dr. Jenner is anxiously awaited. When he arrives there will be a consultation of physicians.

LONDON, Aug. 2.
Among the many enquiries after Mr. Gladstone's health, was one from Lord Beaconsfield through his private Secretary. Sir Wm. Jenner will not visit Mr. Gladstone again until Wednesday.

LONDON, Aug. 2.
Bartle Frere has been recalled from the Governorship of the Cape of Good Hope.

BERLIN, Aug. 2.
Government will ask for a large increase in the military budget.

VIENNA, Aug. 2.
Reports from Constantinople are of a nature to diminish the prestige of the English, among which is the distribution in Turkish military circles of printed accounts of the Afghan disaster, charging the British troops with cowardice and their leaders with incapacity.

PARIS, Aug. 2.
Negotiations for a naval demonstration in Turkish waters are proceeding. The final details are being settled. There has never been the slightest foundation for the report of a joint Anglo-French command of a joint Anglo-French command of the expedition, as all the Powers are agreed in giving the command to England. The periodical rumors representing the scheme as abandoned, and France, Austria, or some other power shrinking from the execution of the plan is equally unfounded, but if the Porte promptly settles the Montenegrin question the demonstration will be suspended.

BOMBAY, Aug. 2.
Khalati Gilzai's garrison are in a precarious state. The tribes have gathered in the vicinity, and much anxiety is felt for the garrison unless Gen. Phayre relieves it, which would delay his march to Candahar.

LONDON, Aug. 2.
It is believed that Sir Garnet Wolseley will sail for India next Friday with a special commission for settling the affairs of the Afghanistan war. His appointment is not looked upon as evidence of the intention of the Government to abandon the country, but it is well known that Sir Garnet combines to a singular degree the faculties of aggression and caution. It is rumored that he will succeed Sir Frederick Haines as Commander-in-Chief in India.

A despatch from Simla states that rumors of a serious rising at Cabul have reached that place. The telegraph wires were cut beyond Yatabund this morning, and it is supposed the act was committed by the discontented sirdars and their followers. There is reason to doubt the fidelity of Abdurrahman Khan as to the assurance he gave the representatives of the British Government at the Durbar, at which he was recognized as Ameer. Evidence of a perverse, if not a treacherous, disposition on his part offers itself in his refusal to attend the consultation held yesterday on the camp ground of the British army near Cabul. Abdurrahman excused himself by saying that in the present condition of the country he thought it not wise to provoke further aggression from Ayooob Khan, especially until reinforcements arrive from India, and the news of a Durbar would incite the tribes to rise in the neighborhood of his capital. The threatening attitude towards the British of Abdurrahman's followers, which he does nothing to rebuke, taken together with his own do-nothing policy, carries with almost the force of a demonstration that he will seek favor with his incensed countrymen by betraying the English into their hands, and then make some kind of a compromise with Ayooob Khan if necessary. The situation consequently grows daily worse and it seems plain that the British must either withdraw from the country, if they can, and acknowledge final defeat, or send armies large enough to make their hold good against a general uprising of all Afghanistan.

PARIS, Aug. 2.
There was a violent storm here yesterday. Great damage to the crops is feared. The *Cote Europeenne*, speaking of the agricultural show, says it had hoped for a better harvest. It is said the present crisis is partly due to the lack of facilities of communication with America, and that journal advocates the remission of taxation, improved means of transportation, and the revision of the land tax.

James T. DeJornette has been indicted for the murder of his sister, whom he found in a disreputable house. He attempted suicide in jail on Saturday.

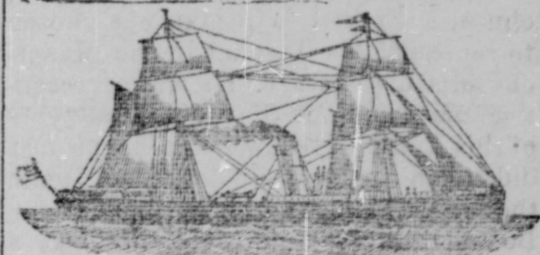
