

Clippings from late Papers.

It is said Hon. John O'Connor will visit British Columbia on official business this summer.

The Kurds are preparing for another invasion of Persia with a force of twenty thousand men.

Calculations based on the result of the census place the population of Ottawa at twenty-seven thousand men.

It is estimated that the British Government will have a majority of 115 on the second reading of the Irish Land Bill.

A political demagogue recently declared that "as long as the people are silent under their wrongs, their oppressors will be deaf to their cries."

The Nihilists' latest game is said to be to endeavour to bring about a conflict between the people and the authorities in the south, when the latter interfere to protect the Jews.

John Rex, solicitor of Belfast, well known for the riotous scenes he created in court when defending participants in party processions, was found dead in bed, having suicided with a revolver.

Glasgow continues to be the second largest city in the United Kingdom. According to the census just completed its population, including suburbs, is 705,103. The population of Liverpool is 681,934.

During the year 1879 the number of persons sentenced to be executed in England and Wales for murder was 34, 16 of whom were executed; in 1880 the number sentenced was 28, of whom 28 were executed.

A story is told of a German shoemaker who, having made a pair of boots for a gentleman of whose financial integrity he had considerable doubt, made the following reply to him when he called for the articles:—"Dar boots ish not quite done but der beel ish made out!"

A Papal bull just issued, modifies many of the conclusions of the committee of Cardinals. The general scope of the bull lessening the parochial system is believed to impede Catholicism. The bull is especially intended to affect the United States and Canada.

An attempt—attributed to the Fenians—was made on Monday night to blow up the Central police station at Liverpool by means of a tube containing either dynamite or gun-cotton. A loud explosion took place and a number of windows were broken, but nobody was hurt.

The latest triumph of the electrician's science is the transmission by M. Camille Faure, the French discoverer, of a box charged with electric energy, from Paris to Glasgow. The capacity of the box is about one cubic foot, and within this small space a force equivalent to nearly one million feet is contained.

The ringleaders of the Chinese rioters at Yale, B. C. have been committed for trial. During their preliminary examination the town was filled with Chinamen, and by a strange coincidence the railway works were burnt down. The fire is not, however, believed to have been the work of the strikers.

The Jews in England are taking collective action to secure the safety of their co-religionists who are the objects of the fanatical outburst in southern Russia. Odessa and Kieff appear to be the centres of these persecutions. In the latter city the Jewish quarter is said to present the appearance of having been sacked by Tartars.

The Buffalo bakers played a dreadful smart trick upon their striking employees and the members of the city trades' unions in general. The journey-men bakers inaugurated the strike season by a demand for increased wages, which was promptly and gracefully conceded. The trades' unions were jubilant, but their mirth was short-lived. The wily bakers put up the price of bread from six to eight cents, and now a thousand trades' union men are rushing about the streets of Buffalo tearing their hair and gnashing their teeth at the thought of having to pay the increased wages of their fellow-unionists.
