MONDAY

NEW MINISTER ARRIVES - Rev. W. A. Harper, who arrived on Friday with his wife and two daughters to take over the pastorate of the Summerville Baptist Church conducted both morning and evening services yesterday with large congregations in attendance. During his announcement he said he felt sure that he would receive full co-operation from the congregation during his ministry here. In the morning he preached a sermon appropriate to Remembrance Day - S.

Mr. Ernest Connolly of West Royalty was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital Friday night suffering from a brain concussion following an accident on the Malpeque Road near St. Dunstan's University. The accident occurred about 6:30.

Mr. Connolly was driving a wagon towards the horse and was thrown from the horse-driven vehicle after being struck from the rear by a car. The accident occurred as two cars were meeting on a narrow road. The wagon was driven into the ditch and badly damaged.

Mr. Connolly was reported to be resting comfortably last night. He is employed at St. Dunstan's University.

A daring robbery occurred sometime on Thursday night or early Friday morning at the drug and jewellery store of Mr. William J. Semple of Kensington and is estimated \$1,200 worth of jewellery was stolen. The thief or thieves gained entrance to the store through a rear window and apparently left by the same way. Although R.C.P. are investigating the case there were no new developments up to late last night.

It was also learned last evening that sometime during Friday night police were notified of another break into a summer cottage at Bedeque but whether the thieves got anything of value could not be learned - S

Citizens of Prince Edward Island turned out by the thousand to see Queen Mary's carpet when it was displayed in Charlottetown on Thursday and Friday of last week. Under the auspices of the four P. E. I. Chapters of the Queen Mary's Guild, a total of almost 5,000 people viewed the carpet in the two days it was displayed. Total receipts were almost \$1,200 which will be this province's contribution towards the \$100,000 which is necessary to purchase the carpet for the National Art Gallery in Ottawa.

Mrs. G. I. K. Drope, first vice-president of the National I.O.D.E. brought the carpet to Charlottetown. She stated that she was very pleasantly surprised at the huge number of people who viewed it, and that it created more interest than she had expected.

Mr. Harvey Douglas, Cherry Hill, a younger brother of the late Mr. J. Lester Douglas, M. P., was nominated on Friday as Liberal candidate to contest the Second District of King's by-election on Dec. 4. The convention, held at Morell, was largely attended, and was presided over by Mr. Wendall Coffin.

One other name was on the ballot of Mr. Chester Pratt, of St. Peter's. The balloting resulted in 30 votes for Mr. Douglas and 19 for Mr. Pratt.

Speakers at the convention included Premier J. Walter Jones, Attorney General W. E. Darby, Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, Messrs. T. J. Nickham, M.P., Russell Clark, M. L. A., and J. B. St. John, M. L. A.

The by-election is being held to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of Hon. H. C. Cox, Minister of Public Works and Highways.

Edward Clark, fifteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Clark, Charlottetown, was drowned early Saturday morning and Mr. Gordon Hutcherson of this City nearly lost his life when the boat in which they were duck hunting near Annandale capsized.

The young boy and Mr. Hutcherson had their boat anchored in a bay when the tide changed. The boat, caught broadside in a terrific current, upset and both occupants were thrown overboard. Mr. Hutcherson managed to grasp the side of the boat.

He was rescued about twenty minutes later by two men from Annandale who put out in the nearby bay. A woman, after seeing the accident from her kitchen window, summoned the men who went to the rescue. The Annandale ferry had been beached for the winter on the previous day.

The R.C.M.P. have been searching for the body for the past two days and will continue grappling operations today. They surveyed the area by air yesterday while dragging operations were carried out from two or three boats.

Edward, Mr. Hutcherson and the latter's two sons, Bob, 15 and David, 11, left for Annandale about 8 o'clock Saturday morning and the accident occurred about two and one half hours later. The two Hutcherson boys were standing on the shore at the time.

Edward was a popular first year student at Prince of Wales College. He is survived by his parents and a brother David. His mother was the former Dorothy Monckley of Summerside.

The family was very well known in Summerside where they resided before moving to Charlottetown about three years ago.

There passed away suddenly and peacefully at her Summerside home on Monday morning, Elytha Bradshaw, wife of Mr. Melville L. Bradshaw. Mrs. Bradshaw had been in failing health for the past six weeks, but retained her usual cheerful disposition and happy outlook until the end.

David and Emma Read of Read's Corner, and was predeceased by three brothers and two sisters. After attending school at Summerside and Prince of Wales College, she taught in the public schools at Freetown, Coleman and New Glasgow until her marriage to Mr. and Mrs. Bradshaw lived a few years at New Glasgow and then moved to Summerside where they spent the great part of their married life.

Besides her sorrowing husband Mrs. Bradshaw is survived by her three daughters, Cecilia (Mrs. Thane A. Campbell) of Summerside, Emma (Mrs. Holman) of Charlottetown, and Marie (Mrs. Blair) of Ottawa; also by two sisters, Cassie (Mrs. Leard) of Scotsburg, Sask.; Emeline (Mrs. MacKay) of New Annan, and by one brother, Mr. Bishop Read, of Summerside.

Mrs. Bradshaw will be sorely missed for her genial personality and neighbourly works, and her memory will be fondly cherished, particularly in the circle of her family and of her intimate friends.

Dr. E. Pearl Hoggood, Assistant Superintendent of the Nova Scotia Hospital, will be visited with the insignia of the Order of St. John by the Prior of the Order, His Excellency the Governor General, at a special ceremony to be held in Rideau Hall, Ottawa, today.

Dr. Hoggood, a native Islander, is one of Canada's outstanding women psychiatrists and has had a long and distinguished association with the Order of St. John. During the period leading up to the war of 1939-45, she was active as a lecturer and Examiner in First Aid and Home Nursing. When war came she identified herself further with the Order by accepting the Office of Divisional Surgeon for one of the Nursing Divisions.

Commander C. H. Little, Director of the University Training Division was in this city last Friday as he made his annual inspection of the Maritime Naval divisions. He stated that he was much impressed with the showing of the Cadets who turned out for inspection, and greatly pleased with the improvements made to the local Naval establishment. Yesterday marked fifty years' continuous service to the public for Mr. Ambler F. Brown, Mr. Brown is a familiar figure to visitors to the Charlottetown Post Office as he sits at his desk inside the postage stamp wicket and dispenses stamps of all denominations.

Many of his customers have commented on his courteousness and kindness, and Mr. Brown will no doubt be the recipient of many good wishes as he goes quilty about his business of stamp vending today. Stamp sales have changed greatly since he first went into the Post Office to take up his duties on November 13, 1900, and Mr. Brown has many memories of ever-changing times and customers. He is now in his 70th year, and still works from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Until quite recently he worked until 8 o'clock at night. For the past seven years he has been assisted by Mrs. W. MacLachlan.

Although Mr. Brown has been in the same work in the same building during his half a century as stamp vendor, his tiny wicket has been moved no less than six times. The present situation on the left of the door is far superior to any previous one, he says.

No records are available for stamp sales during the earlier part of his service, but in January 1930 they totalled 4,771 dollars worth for the month. In January this year Mr. Brown's sales were \$10,300 for the month.

Mrs. Mand Louise Hoare, a resident of Windsor for the past 41 years and widow of Dr. Charles W. Hoare, died at her residence, 1616 Quilliet avenue, following a long illness.

A native of Charlottetown, P. E. I., Mrs. Hoare resided in Halifax for a short time before coming to Windsor in 1909. She has been prominently identified with church and community activities during her long residence in the city.

Three sons and one daughter survive. Lt.-Col. John H. Mothersill, formerly commanding officer of the Essex Scottish Regiment; Major Barton J. Mothersill, Redcar, England; Captain A. D. Mothersill, Windsor. All three sons served with the Scottish veterans of World War I. Miss Margaret Mothersill, the surviving daughter, is executive secretary, Windsor branch, Canadian Red Cross Society. A sister, Miss Ida Henderson, resides in Charlottetown.

A devoted member of All Saints' Church, the late Mrs. Hoare was active in the work of the I. O. O. F. until poor health forced her to give up the work several years ago.

Funeral services were held from All Saints' Church at 2 p.m., with the Rev. Carl Swan, rector, in charge. Burial was in Windsor Grove Cemetery.

At approximately five o'clock yesterday morning a fire of undetermined origin destroyed a building at Calibek's Corner, Bedeque, owned by Mr. W. B. Johnston.

The building housed his complete equipment used in his bee keeping business. Stored in the building along with the sheet iron extractors and other articles was the community movie projector which was usually stored with Mr. Johnston when not in use. He estimated the loss of buildings and all this equipment at \$2,000 with no insurance.

The fire was discovered by Mr. Ralph Callbeck, who had been awakened by the continual barking of his dog. Mr. Callbeck immediately notified Mr. Johnston and

others in the community who rushed to the scene but were unable to do anything to save the building or any of the contents. They were, however, instrumental in preventing the spread of the fire to the adjoining garage and residence and when the Summerside fire chemical engine arrived the flames had been brought under control.

Mr. Johnston could assign no reason for the origin of the fire. No stove was in the building and he had not been inside it for several days. He stated it was not his intention to purchase new equipment for the coming season. He noted that he was indeed grateful to the people of the community for their ready response and that of the Summerside Fire Department. - S

The second request for the Provincial Government to take the case of Maritime potato growers in seeking a support price for this year's crop was made yesterday afternoon at the King's County Federation of Agriculture meeting in Morell Community Hall. Mr. Wilfred MacDonald, Brudenell, presided over the well attended meeting.

Mr. Ernest Underhay, Bay Fortune, was elected president for the coming year succeeding Mr. Wilfred MacDonald who guided the County Federation during its first year of operation. Mr. Louis MacFarlane, Morell and Mrs. Bert Hicken, Alliston were elected vice-presidents. The secretary-treasurer is Mr. J. P. McIsaac, Rock Barra.

Five new directors, one for each district were elected. Third District directors are Mr. Haddon Cornwall, Bridgetown; Mr. MacLeod, Bridgetown; Mr. Rita Jamieson, Sturgeon; Third District, Mr. Malone, Morell.

In asking the Provincial Government to press for potato aid the members commended the Government for their intent to take the matter direct to Ottawa next week.

Mr. D. A. MacDonald, Glenfinglan, gave a comprehensive report of the work done by the Potato Marketing Board. Other speakers were Messrs. Floyd Griesbach, secretary National Farm Forum; Louis O'Connor, president of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture; Earl Ings, of Earncliffe; J. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the Federation and Mr. Wilfred MacDonald.

It was a big day at the Fox Show Pavilion yesterday. There was a large attendance of fox breeders from various parts of the province and over 200 foxes were tabled. Judge G. A. Callbeck had a difficult task but each and every one of the foxes was carefully scrutinized before being finally placed.

There were many remarks on the good quality of the animals and there certainly did not seem to be any retrogression from other years. The adults were particularly good and not a single off-color fox could be noticed.

Some of the classes had entries up to 20 and practically filled the long table. A pleasant surprise was the attendance of H. B. Gates of Middleton, N.S., and Frank Mayne of Westchester, N.S. Mr. Gates took away two firsts and Mr. Mayne one first and they were warmly congratulated by the other competitors.

Judging was completed for all classes of silvers, probably one of the biggest days' judging since the exhibitions were first started. This morning the silver championships will be decided and the platinum classes and white marked silvers. The remainder of the judging, which will probably consist entirely of mink, or perhaps may include championships for platinum foxes, will take place on Friday morning.

Last night a very interesting educational program was given in the Charlottetown Hotel to a large group of fox farmers.

Tonight the big gala gathering, the foxmen's banquet, will be held at the Charlottetown Hotel, commencing at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are available at the Fox Pavilion or at the Hotel. The program has been prepared so as to give the

The mink exhibits were good, showing considerable improvement over the previous years and affording evidence that the ranchers had mastered the art of mating to produce good types of mutations which are now so much
