### Against Mothers Wishes Girl Follows Boy To Mt.

Dear Mary Haworth: After Steve spent his second summer in my home town, where his parents have a summer place, I left with him to come to Montreal. He is 20 and I am 21 and, although we had been sweethearts only a short time, I knew that I loved and trusted him. I came away with him against my mother's wishes, as she felt I had known him too briefly. Also she was concerned about my finding work here, but she wouldn't stand in my way.

Last November we went back to see her, at which time I told her we were having an affair. Now I am six months pregnant, and although we are deeply in love, we can't marry, as Steve's father would be furious and wouldn't support him through college, and I want him to complete his education.

HOW HOLD MAN?  
I quit my office job in February and have been living in a foster home, where I do light housework and care for two children. I like it here very well; but mother learned from a friend on a visit to Montreal that I had left the office weeks ago, and I have a worried letter from her. Naturally she is upset, not knowing what goes on, though she may have an inkling, after our talk last November.

Steve wants me to give our baby for adoption—so the baby will have a good home and not be deprived. Steve's parents are wealthy and he believes that money, or luxuries at least, are important. I want to keep Steve, yet I am at a loss to know what is right.

Steve says that after I write mother, if she wants us to come home for a day, he will take me and explain to her that he loves me and wants to marry me. His parents don't know about us yet.

ESSENTIAL STEP  
Dear B.Y.: If Steve cares or intends to figure in your life henceforth, he ought to marry you immediately, without explaining to anybody. In my opinion, this is the essential first step towards bringing dignity out of disorder, in the sorry situation—assuming, as you say, that you love one another very much.

If Steve can't finish college on his own, at a slower pace, with your earning aid if necessary—and give up luxuries to salvage your honor—he probably isn't worth the money his father might expend in supporting him through.

So it doesn't make sense, from the character-angle, to spare him the disciplines of premature fatherhood, on the theory that you would be fostering his social development by producing a "fatherless" babe, while he (Steve) continues to drift through school on a bachelor basis.

CERTAIN COSTS  
As I see the picture, you and Steve are equally responsible for going off the track. Evidently you headed for trouble by mutual consent. He probably wasn't the aggressor in the liaison. Rather, I think, he simply co-operated with your pursuit of him; and that you had made up your mind you must have him, at any price, some time before you accompanied him to Montreal.

Both you and Steve are being taught by experience that life is a pay-as-you-go proposition. You can't play fast-and-loose without getting the bill, eventually. And though you may dodge the bill collector for a while, the longer the reckoning is postponed, the bigger the assessment, usually. There is no escaping the costs of man-woman relatedness.

Hence it is always a mistake for a girl to commit herself to serious intimacy with a man—and being in love doesn't alter the rule—unless she has first in-

sured the alliance against multiple risks, by investing in the social security that marriage is. If Steve loves you, he will logically pick up the check for your oversight in this respect; and face his parents as your husband with that much manhood, at least to his credit. In which case, you would keep the baby, I should suppose.

The president then took over. Roll call was answered by 18 members. The minutes were read and approved. Collection amounted to \$1.56. New commit-

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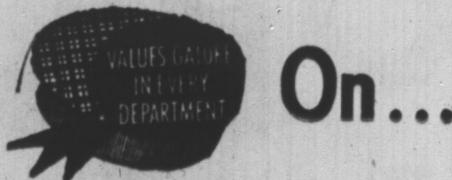
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## "GODLESS" WORK
