

Latest from Europe. News by the Cable!

Berlin, Nov. 16.—Admiralty of Prussia are engaged in the creation of a strong fleet and naval recruiting is ordered to commence immediately in the Duchies.

Vienna, Nov. 16.—The Journal to-day in an editorial says, customs negotiations commenced between Austria and Prussia; proposals calculated to pacify Europe.

London, Nov. 15th.—The London Telegraph denies the report that a Commission is about to be formed to settle the "Alabama" claims. The English Cabinet has lately been holding Councils almost daily.

United States Consul Morse publishes in the newspapers to-day a letter, in which he explains the agreement between the American Government and France, Trenholm & Co. He states that the title of the United States to all Confederate property is therein fully recognized, and said property is subject to loyal legal liens for advances.

Quebec, Nov. 16. The Mayor has received another despatch from London by the Atlantic Cable authorizing him to draw for \$20,000 more, for the relief of the sufferers by the late fire. This makes a total of \$70,000 from London. Gold 142.

London, Nov. 17th. An editorial, says the Government has no present intention to refer the Alabama claims to the consideration of a Royal Commission.

The design is (the Times continues) to institute inquiries in regard to the Neutrality Laws, without prejudice to the Alabama claims, which are still under consideration.

Lord Cranworth, it was thought, would be chosen President of the commission.

Paris, Nov. 17th. Mrs. Maj. Gen. John A. Dix arrived here to-day. Gold (N.Y.) 141.

London, Nov. 19. Great floods are devastating the counties of York and Lancaster, and many lives have been lost by drowning.

The report is confirmed that Chili and Peru have consented to accept the mediation of the governments of France and England.

Reports are in circulation that fighting has been renewed in Candia. It is said that the government is alive to the fact that large numbers of Fenians have been arming in Ireland weekly and is well prepared to meet any rebellious movement.

The Reform demonstration in Edinburgh on Saturday was a very large and imposing one. U. S. 5-20's 70 1-2.

Florence, Nov. 19. Baron Riolisca, Prime Minister of the Italian government, has issued a circular discouraging the agitation of the Roman question. Italy, he says, will be neutral and await the certain triumph of her rights.

Berlin, Nov. 19. It is positively stated that Bismarck will soon resume the active duties of his office.

London, Nov. 19. A new Russian loan of six millions has been announced. The Dutch Chambers opened; the King's opening speech expressed hopes for reciprocal confidence and loyalty to Constitution.

An official report of the Commander of the allies in the Paraguayan war admits a severe defeat of the allies in the assault upon Fort Curupaity. The protest of Bolivia against war on Paraguay charged the allies with intent to dispossess its territory under the plea of war with Paraguay, but the Argentine Minister denies the charge.

SAN FRANCISCO, 18th. Victoria advises the question of annexation to the United States is under discussion. The Victoria Telegraph, newspaper, says: "England gives assistance but saddles us with cumbersome form of Government against our wishes, the Federal authorities spend hundreds of thousands of dollars every year on territory and ask the inhabitants to pay but little of the outlay in consequence of its infancy. Every British Colony is devoted to chronic discontent, culminating often in armed outbreaks, while in the United States territories scarcely a reconstrance is heard. Our country is killed by extravagant men at the head of affairs while others steadily progress under the management of the people." Gold (N. Y.) 141.
