Light Situation Remains Constant

The late blight situation continues to remain constant, no disease being reported from Nova Scotia and no increase over the two trace infections has occurred in Prince Edward Island.

Although there has been more shower activity lately the atmospheric humidities during the intervals have generally been below the critical level and night temperatures have usually been low. It is not likely, therefore, that infections have occurred in the region.

Flea beetles and aphids are quite numerous in some fields and, where moisture supply is low, these pests will hasten the maturity of the tops unless they are controlled. Growers should soon start to pull a few tops at regular intervals to check on tuber size so that they may plan to top kill when the maximum volume of marketable potatoes is present.

Continued from page 1 cesses of free collective bargaining. Mr. Pearson, Health Minister MacEachen and Immigration Minister Marchand argued that by putting the recommendations for 1966 by two conciliation board reports in the bill the government had given a "moral" or implicit guarantee that the workers would get a total of at least 18 per cent over two years.

Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, NDP Leader Douglas, David Lewis (NDP-York South) and others argued that moral guarantees would have no affect before a board of arbitration. Writing a 1967 minimum into the bill would ensure that the unions would not have to fight this point with the railways and improve chances of the workers obeying the legislation and returning to work, they said.

After the government conceded this, it agreed to a proposal by H. A. Olson (SC-Medicine Hat) that the bill stipulate that an arbitrator must recommend at least an 18-per-cent total increase for all pay rate categories. Mr. Olson said the railways might average out the various increases, leaving some classes of employees with increases of less than 18 per cent.

The prime minister told the Commons that the 18-per-cent increase can be revised upward through mediation or, possibly, arbitration. He was replying to Mr. Lewis who maintained government statements implied this percentage was a ceiling. Mr. Diefenbaker then demanded that the government in-

RAISE AUTOMATION

Automation flared into a major issue of the debate Thursday with the NDP proposing an amendment to apply the Freedman formula to the railway industry, including the right to strike if changes in working conditions due to automation are unacceptable to labor.

The so-called formula, in the inquiry report by Mr. Justice Samuel Freedman of Manitoba into railway crew run-throughs, would oblige railways to negotiate with unions before introducing any technological change affecting working conditions. Mr. Diefenbaker agreed with Transport Minister Pickersgill that allowing the right to strike would defeat the purposes of the present bill, but said an amendment should be put in to compel the railways to negotiate matters.

Mr. Nicholson was willing to give a formal undertaking that the mediators would be instructed to include these items in negotiations. But he said this was implied by a clause in the bill that would send "any matters presently in dispute" to negotiation. The Conservative leader accepted Mr. Nicholson's pledge but forced a vote on an amendment to put these instructions in the bill. With the NDP supporting the Conservatives, the amendment was defeated 79 to 63.

A New Democratic party amendment that would have required arbitrators to write a contract clause setting out the Freedman formula "in an appropriate form" was defeated 145 to 15, with only NDP members supporting it. Other votes in which the government came out on top during clause-by-clause study were:

Two amendments by Andrew Brewin (NDP-Toronto Greenwood), one to place a floor for negotiation under fringe benefits by ensuring that vacations and health benefits settlements be at least as much as recommended in the conciliation board reports. His other would have set Oct. 15 instead of Nov. 15 as the time for the labor minister to decide whether mediation on outstanding issues is progressing and whether to send them to arbitration. -An amendment by Gerald

Island Member Returns Home

Gerard Doucette, an active member in Red Cross Youth at Tignish Regional High School, one of two representatives chosen from across Canada to attend a Junior Red Cross Training Center in Ulorozava, Poland, arrived home yesterday.

The Center was held from August 7th to August 28th with 65 representatives from Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Canada, Finland, Germany, Dem. Rep., Great Britain, Holland, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Soviet Union and Sweden. One of the most outstanding things about the Center says Gerard was "the feeling of belonging to one big happy family regardless of race, color or creed. Everyone knew everyone else in spite of the 2 official languages, English and Russian."

Lectures were held on Polish Red Cross activities, international co-operation among Red Cross youth and how to develop this co-operation, mutual assistance and understanding. Each delegation was required to put on a demonstration on
