GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The St. James Gazette, in a leading editorial, asks the question, "How does Great Britain stand with the United States in regard to the Nicaragua Canal?" Pursuing the subject, the paper adds: "It would be well for Mr. Curzon, under secretary for foreign affairs, to put the question in the house of commons and obtain a clear answer."

LONDON, August 21.—The Daily Telegraph prints a Vienna despatch saying that a balloon containing two Russian staff officers and a professor of the St. Petersburg meteorological institute, has descended near Jaroslavl, in Austrian Galicia, and that the occupants of the balloon have been arrested by the authorities.

NEW YORK, August 21.—A special from Washington says the financial affairs of Alsworth B. Spoford, librarian of congress and chief of the copyright bureau, are in an inextricable tangle and his shortage to the government is at least \$35,000.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—It is stated that the Duke of York is prepared to sell a valuable collection of postage stamps, which he wishes to dispose of as it stands, while Baron Ferdinand de Rothschild, who has made the most liberal offer for the collection thus far received, wants to take only the rarest specimens.

OTTAWA, August 21.—The salvation army delegates, who have been searching out a site for a colony in the Northwest, will be here on Friday to consult with the deputy minister of the interior. They are favourably impressed with Alberta. The department will not offer any special inducements to help out its scheme.

LONDON, August 21.—The following cablegram has been received at the London office of the Wesleyan missionary society: "Africa is a continent of immense promise. Officials implicated.
