WAS BLIND NOW SEES

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 4.—After four years of blindness following injuries overseas which destroyed the right eye and severely injured the left, Hector MacDonald, North Sydney can see again following an operation in a Hamdon, Ont. hospital, undergone on the advice of a priest of the Shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre. Mr. MacDonald who was a member of the Nova Scotia Highland brigade, went to the front with the 73rd Montreal regiment. He received injuries at Vimy Ridge.

OBJECTING TO COURT'S ACTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—A number of threatening letters have been received by Police Judge Sylvian J. Lazarus, who conducted the preliminary hearing of the murder charge against Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle, in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe, and have been turned over to the police. Judge Lazarus announced today. Most of the letters were precipitated by Judge Lazarus' action in reducing the murder charge to manslaughter, he said. The letters were not made public.

Murdered Woman Possibly Native of New Brunswick

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Papers found today in an old grip in a room where the body of a murdered woman known only as Mrs. Fay was discovered last night, indicated police say, that her name also might have been Townsend, and that she was a native either of Cambridge, Mass., Halifax, or possibly New Brunswick. A small box in the room bore a label showing that it had been sent to Mrs. Fay from "Edith" in Cambridge, Mass. The police at Cambridge, Halifax and Montreal has been asked to investigate.

An autopsy performed at the morgue this morning, disclosed that the woman had been strangled with an apron string; found wound around her neck. The examination revealed that the victim, who was about 23, was soon to become a mother.

Just a month ago the woman, known only as "Mrs. Fay," took a room at a West 22nd street house. She was accompanied by a good-looking youth of about 25, who, it was understood, was her husband. Roomers in the house saw little of the couple and the young woman displayed a reticence that repelled any friendly advances by the other women.

A week ago tomorrow the supposed husband told Mrs. Catherine Gannon, the housekeeper, that his wife had gone to the hospital for treatment preparatory to the birth of her baby, and he was giving up the room. He received a fifty cent deposit he had made on the door key and left. Nothing further was thought of the couple until yesterday when Mrs. Gannon discovered the woman's body buried under a pile of newspapers and debris in a closet on the top floor.

A couple named Mr. and Mrs. Boulanger, who came from Montreal, occupied a room diagonally across from that occupied by the "Fays." Mrs. Boulanger, it is stated, was the only person in the house with whom Mrs. Fay was friendly. The couple left last Monday for Montreal. Detectives admitted that there was little likelihood that the Boulangers would be able to shed any light on the case.

Mrs. L. R. Boulanger, at her home 279 Drolet street, stated yesterday afternoon that she had known Mrs. Fay for about two weeks owing to the fact that she and her husband had spent two weeks in the rooming house at 341 West 22nd street, New York. Mrs. Boulanger said that her husband was away at present. He is employed as chief engineer of a ship and she thought that he had not heard yet of the discovery of Mrs. Fay's body.

"There is one point that puzzles me," said Mrs. Boulanger. "When I spoke to Mrs. Fay she told me that her name was Townsend. Why she should have given me a wrong name, I don't understand I used to see her often, but I seldom saw her husband. He, however, had met my husband and he was supposed to be a ship captain they talked of ship matters. He once gave my husband the addresses of several places where engines were to be dismantled and my husband gave them to a man who was looking for employment of this nature. The addresses were false."

Mrs. Boulanger said that when Mrs. Fay disappeared she and the other persons in the house did not find it strange as Mrs. Fay had said that his wife had gone to a hospital. Mrs. Boulanger knew that Mrs. Fay was not well and this did not surprise her.

Mrs. Boulanger and her husband left New York last Monday and came to Montreal to their residence at 379 Drolet street. They left their address in order that any mail be forwarded to them here.
