

Shortage Of Doctors In Sight, Is CMA Warning

HALIFAX (CP)—The Canadian Medical Association warned Tuesday that Canada will face a shortage of doctors unless more high-calibre students enter medical schools.

The CMA's general council decided at its wind-up session here to launch an all-out program to sell medicine as a profession to the nation's youth.

General-Secretary Dr. A. D. Kelly of Toronto said "more energy is needed to influence the right boys and girls to enter medical school." Although some schools are "bulging," universities have reported definite slumps in the number of applicants, Dr. Kelly said.

"This narrows our choice of students," he said. "As a result some medical schools have lowered their standards for admitting candidates."

The 180-member general council opened the CMA's 91st annual

meeting Monday. Scientific sessions begin today.

RIGHTS OF A DOCTOR

The council's economic committee said in a report released at a press conference that doctors must have the right in making agreements with governments to choose the type and location of their practice and to negotiate agreements covering payment.

Committee chairman Dr. R. K. Thomson of Edmonton said "there is some concern within the profession to be forewarned" against any break in present doctor-patient relations.

Dr. Kelly said the CMA cannot estimate the doctor shortage in 20 years because of the number of immigrant physicians entering Canada. Canada "is losing about 25 per cent of its 1,000 annual medical graduates to the United States. An "indefinite number" of these return, he said.

There is now one doctor for every 950 Canadians, a CMA spokesman said. The figure has remained unchanged for more than 50 years.

ASK DEFINITION

The council decided to ask Health Minister Monteith for "a specific definition" of diagnostic services included in the National Hospital Plan. A spokesman said hospitals want to know exactly what facilities will be included.

Dr. Kelly said "there remains a zone of uncertainty" in the plan's area of diagnostic services.

The council's public relations committee recommended that Members of Parliament should be "informed on various aspects of medicine in Canada."

Tuesday was Nova Scotia Day for the CMA. Premier Stanfield addressed a luncheon meeting. He traced the development of the medical profession in the province.

At a late hour last night His Worship indicated that he had not yet received formal notice of resignation from Councilor Foster.

FOSTER RECONSIDERING

Councilor Foster stated yesterday that he was reconsidering his expressed intention to resign as a member of the civic body.

Explaining his position, Councilor Foster stated that he had decided to hold up his resignation by 24 hours in order to give full consideration to the request of many citizens that he reconsider his stand.

"I am still convinced," he said, "that it is proper for me to tender my resignation, but in fairness to those who elected me, it is only right to give the matter complete consideration."

Loads Partial Pulpwood Cargo At Georgetown

The 2,695-ton Canadian freighter Liverpool Rover under the command of Captain Keizer, arrived in Georgetown from Liverpool, N. S., early Monday morning and immediately started loading a cargo of 650 cords of

rough pulp from the A. H. Anderson pulp storage yard there. Loading operations were completed on Monday evening and the ship sailed for Summerside to complete her cargo.

The Liverpool Rover was piloted in and out of port by harbor pilot Temple Gotell.

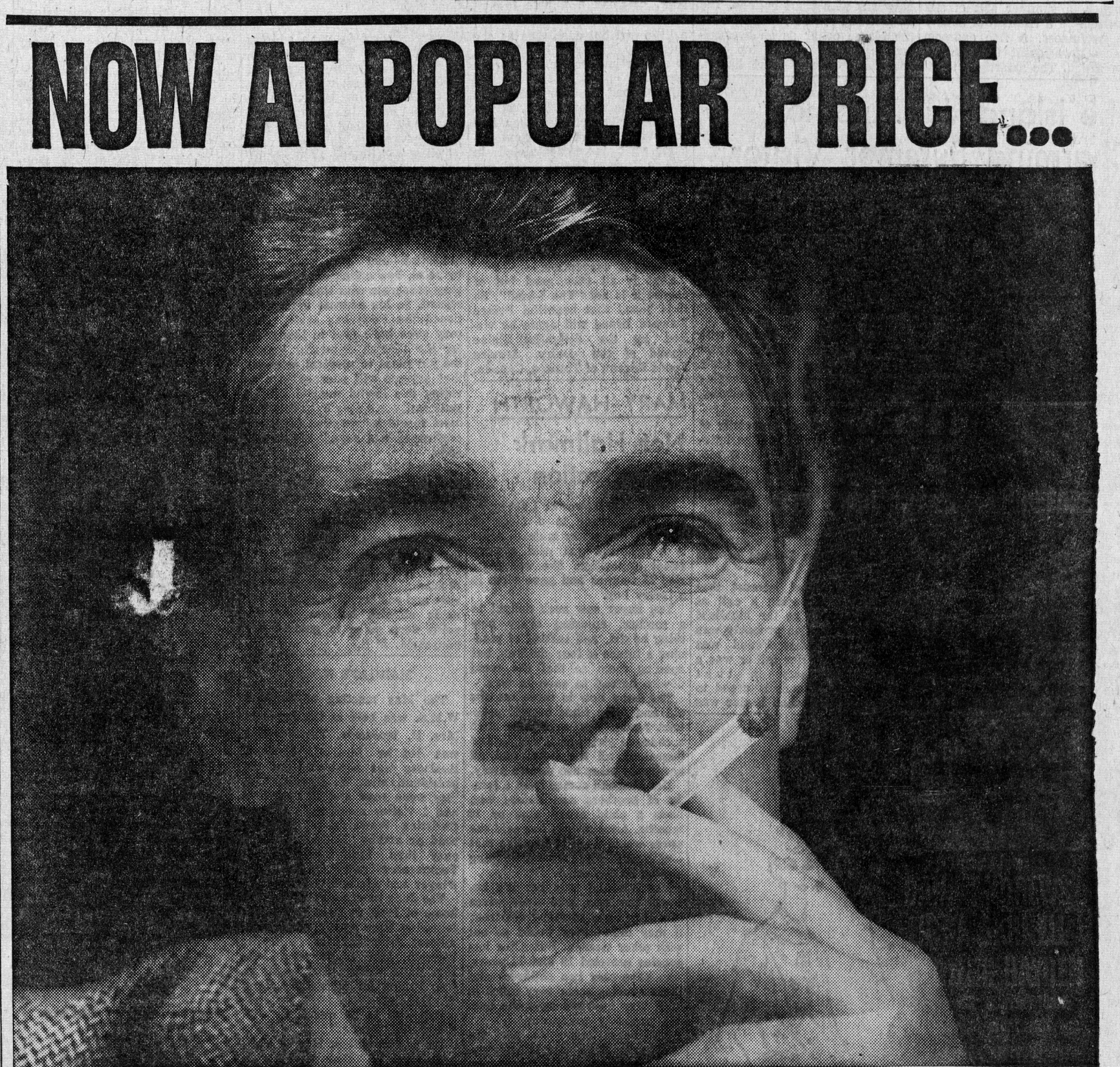
