Express Concern S'ide May Lose Contract To Supply Airport Power

Deep concern was expressed last night by the members of the Summerside Board of Trade over the prospect that the Town of Summerside may possibly lose the contract for supplying the power to the R. C. A. F. station and that the option would go to another power company in the Province.

President R. S. Hinton stated that he believed that the Town of Summerside had always supplied power to the port at a fair and equitable rate and asked if the Town of Summerside was or was not going to continue to supply the power.

It was the general feeling of the members present that this was a matter which the board should definitely take steps to inquire into and a special committee, consisting of Messrs. Fred Bell, Donald Baker and L. R. Allen, was appointed to act in co-operation with the electric light committee of the Summerside Town Council to investigate.

His Worship Henry W. Wedge said that a special unit at the plant was purchased with a view of supplying the increased power required by the erection of the new houses at the port. If the Town of Summerside should lose the contract "we will have a million dollar plant one half idle." If the change over should be made, he said, it will be without having consulted the Town and he contended that the Town of Summerside would certainly be getting a raw deal should such a change be made.

Recommendations brought in by the town improvement committee at the annual meeting of the board in January were discussed. The town over a period of years since the installation of the present system.

The prevalent practice of small boys riding on the back of cars and trucks on the icy streets was considered by the board and it was felt that drastic steps should be taken to curb this dangerous practice before a fatality occurs. Discusses C. N. R. Proposal
The meeting gave considerable discussion to the proposed substitution by the Canadian National Railway in this Province, of buses and trucks to replace some of the regular scheduled train services.

It was the opinion of some of the members that such an arrangement could eventually smother private enterprise if a monopoly were granted for bus and trucking in Prince Edward Island.

President R. S. Hinton said that the Board of Trade was the champion of free enterprise. He read a letter from Mr. Peter Pate, president of the Alberton and

S'ide Member In Debate On Draft Address

Disappointment that the municipal power plant at Summerside, which has been supplied electricity to the airport in the Prince County capital, should lose this profitable source of revenue was expressed strongly in the Legislature yesterday by Mr. Carol W. Delaney, Fifth Prince, in speaking on the Draft Address.

(It had been indicated by Premier Jones in speaking on Wednesday at the Maritime Electric Company was running a 33,000 volt line from Charlottetown to the Summerside airport this year).

Mr. Delaney said the municipal plant had just purchased an engine at a cost of over \$100,000. "I don't see why they can't run that line through without taking the Summerside airport from us," he said.

Referring to the activities at the airport, he said the air force comprised 600 or 700 men and there were 150 civilians employed. It is one of the largest airports in Canada and has one of the best records on the continent for good flying weather.

Noting reference made by the member from Souris (Mr. St. John) to the amount of fish caught in King's County, Mr. Delaney cited the following figures of catches last year in proof of the predominance of Prince County:

Mackerel: King's, 2258 cwt.; Queen's, 5178; Prince, 8686. Herring: King's, 2279 cwt.; Queen's, 13,784; Prince, 27,333. Lobsters: King's, 27,251; Queen's, 13,784; Prince, 27,333. Oysters: King's, 1,427 cwt.; Queen's, 9,218; Prince, 14,058. Cod: King's, 25,728 cwt.; Queen's, 15,554; Prince, 19,759. Hake: King's, 19,905 cwt.; Queen's, 2,696; Prince, 10,863.

He also cited figures for horses, cattle, poultry, sheep and lambs, turkeys, geese and ducks, claiming superiority for Prince County in most cases. In cheese production, he pointed out, Prince County produced to the value of \$93,000 against a combined value of \$90,000 in King's and Queen's.

"Putting everything together I think that Prince County does about as much business as Queen's and King's together," he said. "That is one reason why we should have the trans-Canada highway run up to Summerside."

Navigators Leave Tomorrow For Flight To U. K.

The eight members of the No. 2 Specialist Navigation course with five members of the instructional staff will take off from the R. C. A. F. station, Summerside at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning on a 6,900 mile trip to the United Kingdom and back. The purpose of the flight is to visit service and civilian navigational establishments there to give the students and instructors an appreciation of the current navigational problems of the Royal Air Force. They will also study developments in the field of navigation and the flights will give the students practical experience and provide them with an opportunity to practice the techniques they have been taught in the classroom.

They will go by way of Gander in Newfoundland and return by way of Azores. The scheduled date for their return is March 17th. Flights of this nature have already been made to similar establishments in Canada and the United States. The course will complete its training late in April with two weeks of flying in the Arctic.

While in England five main centers will be visited. The first stop will be at the R. A. F. Central Navigation School at Shawbury which is similar in purpose to the R. C. A. F. Navigation School at Summerside.

There they will study and compare the navigational training procedures and techniques of the R. A. F. and the R. C. A. F. A round table conference will be held on the latest developments in air navigation in which members of the R. A. F. and R. C. A. F. specialist courses will participate.

From Shawbury they will go to Ilford, Essex to visit the plant of Henry Hughes and Sons Ltd. to observe the problems and methods of manufacturing modern aircraft instruments. The third stop will be at the R. A. F. Flying College at Nanyby to study problems confronting the R. A. F. in all-weather high performance flying.

The last two places visited will be the Royal Aircraft Establishment, Farnborough, Hants and the Telecommunication Research Establishment, Malvern.

Squadron Leader W. L. Gillespie of Summerside and Toronto, who is in charge of special courses at the Summerside station and who commanded the previous flights will also command this one. S-L J. C. R. Brown, D.F.C. and Bar of Summerside and North Toronto will be the captain of the Lancaster aircraft Zenith and F-O J. L. A. Roussel, D.F.C. of 6611 De la Roche, Montreal will be the captain of the Polaris. -S.
