Second U. S. Rail Strike Threatens

CHICAGO, May 18 — (AP) — Government intervention appeared tonight as the only hope for averting the second major United States railroad strike in a week. The Switchmen's Union of North America (A. F. L.) has directed its members to leave their jobs at 6 A. M. local time Tuesday on 10 midwestern and western railroads.

Arthur J. Glover, union president, announced the strike call in a speech last night, to support demands for a 40-hour work week at the same pay received now for 48 hours.

The National (Railway) Mediation Board is expected to try its hand in this dispute. This Board mediated the agreement last Tuesday that ended the strike of 18,000 locomotive firemen against six key rail systems over hiring of an extra fireman on big diesel engines.

Jap Princess To Wed Commoner

By Roy Macarney TOKYO, May 18 — (Reuters) — Princess Taka, 20-year-old second daughter of Emperor Hirohito, shifted her personal belongings by truck today to the new home where she will live when she marries a 26-year-old commoner, Toshimichi Takatsukasa, Saturday.

The furniture bore the 16-petal chrysanthemum imperial crest. At the Imperial Palace today Princess Taka went through a formal court ceremony of farewell.

Dressed in ceremonial robes, she paid her respects to the spirit of her ancestors in the inner sanctum of the palace. After bidding farewell to the Emperor and Empress, she went to take leave of her grandmother.

The wedding will present a curious blend of the mediaeval and the modern.

Emperor Hirohito and the Princess Nagako are breaking a centuries-old tradition by attending the wedding ceremony at the former home of the Emperor's brother, Prince Takamatsu, in a Tokyo suburb. Hirohito Japanese parents have ignored the wedding ceremonies of their children.

The Princess herself is flouting ancient superstition by marrying this year—the "year of the tiger." Since the middle ages, Japanese have believed that any woman wed upon herself bad luck and unhappiness.

Labor Party Seeks New Twist To Old Ideas

By ALAN HARVEY LONDON, May 18 — (CP) — The Labor Party goes into conference this week-end in search of a new twist on old ideas.

Of the two-day meeting in Dorking, Surrey, the liberal Manchester Guardian said today the conference may be the most important gathering of its kind ever held. Its views, and that of many thoughtful commentators, is probably based on these factors:

Labor came to full power in 1945 with high hopes of establishing the new social order it had advocated in years of struggle. In the five-year term that followed, the Party's legislative machine ground out 313 bills in pursuit of its central aims of economic planning, social justice and full employment.

Now, it is argued, socialism has spent its first momentum, the acts are on the statute books, and a new approach is needed.

Most members of the Party appear to recognize the desirability of fresh thinking on fundamental issues — partly to cope with the

philosophy and a career as naturalist. It's trying to unravel the mystery of reverse migration on the Point.

Wages Increase, Employment Drops. OTTAWA, May 18 — (CP) — Canada's biggest refunding loan in history was put on the block today and taken up—in 60 seconds.

The Bank of Canada, opening its books at 9 A. M. EDT to receive orders for \$743,000,000 worth of Federal bonds closed them again at 9:10 A. M.

Finance Minister Abbott announced later that the offering had been "heavily over-subscribed."

He told the Commons that because Canada's call for the bonds were far greater than the government intended to issue, allotments of both the long and short-term varieties will have to be "substantially less than the subscriptions."

"We may all take pride in the remarkable success of this loan flotation," he said. "The enthusiastic and general response of investors throughout the country provides substantial evidence of prosperous conditions and of confidence in the future of the country."

Although giving no figures for the total number of persons employed in the industries surveyed, the Bureau reported that the employment index fell to 184.6 at March 1 from 187.2 at Feb. 1. The index is calculated on the basis that the number employed in the industries in 1926 equals 100.
