Let's Talk It Over
 We were talking to a group of boys recently and were amazed to learn how many youngsters in Summerside have had their bicycles stolen and never recovered them. One boy bought a new bicycle on the installment plan, making payments from money he earned as newsboy. Two weeks after he bought it, the bicycle was stolen and he hasn't seen it since, though he is still making the payments. Some of the bikes that were stolen were dumped over a wharf, and found later in a useless condition. Apparently the thief, or thieves, didn't think it safe to keep them but were determined that in any case the owner should not recover them. This would seem to be a new low in petty thievery, which is a long way from an exalted calling at best.

WE CAN appreciate the fact that tracking down the young criminals isn't easy. There are so many ways to change the bicycles, making identification difficult. But failure to apprehend these thugs in embryo is especially deplorable at their age, because, as they stand on the threshold of a criminal career, it sells them the idea that crime does pay. If summary justice could overtake them, with the attendant disagreeable aftermath, mixed with some wise counsel, it might tend to discourage them from embarking on a life of crime. Though there are unfortunate people in whom the predisposition for lawbreaking seems almost impossible to eradicate, there must be many others whose feet could be turned into paths of honesty if the deterrents and guidance came into operation early enough.

Cheese Making To Begin At New Plant In S'ide
 —Cheese making will begin at the Amalgamated Dairies in Summerside on Monday morning and the new plant will be in production of butter and cheese before Christmas.
 The manufacture of cheese next week will be the first phase in a production program that will eventually utilize everything of value in the milk and cream received at the plant, which is located on Water Street East.
 All of the cheese equipment is new in every respect and although future plans call for the manufacture of cheese in various sized packages, for the time being, it will be packaged in the familiar "triplets". The cold storage for cheese is ready for use and the deep storage for butter will be completed before the plant is in full operation.
 A feature of the cheese curing room is the definite and exacting control which can be maintained in regard to temperature and humidity—two essential factors enabling the plant to produce cheese of consistent and uniform quality.
 Mr. J. S. Wright is manager of the new plant, G. L. Monkley, secretary, and C. E. Gamble plant superintendent and fieldman. The manager yesterday stated that everything about the new plant construction and installation is being done in accordance with the recommendation of and direct supervision of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and added that consumers were assured of the continuity of the high quality of the products as the well known butter and cheese makers, C. M. Johnson and O. G. Johnston, Bedeque; Cyril Conzick and Robert Mountain of Kensington; Lawrence MacDonald of Tyne Valley; Ben Peters of Grand River and Eric Arsensault of Abrams Village will have charge of production.
 Amalgamated Dairies is an amalgamation of six long-established concerns composed of three butter factories—Dunk River, Kensington, and North Tryon, and three cheese factories—Tyne Valley, Grand River and Abrams Village. Since amalgamation and while the new plant in Summerside is being completed, the organization has continued the manufacture of butter at Kensington and Bedeque and cheese at Tyne Valley.
 The new building embraces the former Pioneer building on Water Street East, and to this a large extension has been built. It is a fire proof building of brick and tile construction. It measures 170 feet in length with an additional 26 feet for boiler room, etc. Its width is 50 feet in that part which was formerly the Pioneer building with the extension being a width of 80 feet.
 The receiving arrangement at the new building leaves little to be desired. The cans are unloaded from trucks onto conveyer belts which carries them to attendants inside the building. Here each can is dumped into a weighing tank divided for milk and cream. The weight is then automatically printed on a card which records the weight of each producer's milk or cream. The milk or cream then

pours into separate tanks beneath the weighing tank and is pumped away through stainless steel pipes for use in the various parts of the plant. The producer's milk or cream can pass through a machine which washes and scalds the can and places it on a conveyer belt which returns it to the truck on which it arrived at the creamery.
 About 3-4 of 1 per cent butterfat is left in the whey after the making of cheese and this will be separated from the whey and manufactured into whey butter.
