### MAKING A WILL IN CHINA.

The making of a will is an occasion  
of feasting and rejoicing in families in  
China. It is customary for parents,  
when they are advanced in years, to  
divide their property among their  
children. On a lucky day, selected by  
a geomancer, the parents meet their  
children in the principal hall of the  
house, or in the ancestral hall. All are  
attired for the occasion in their richest  
robes. The parents occupy the chief  
seats and the sons stand, arranged ac-  
cording to seniority, on the side of  
the father, while the daughters are  
ranged on the side of the mother.  
Having informed his children of the  
amount of his property, the father pro-  
ceeds to divide it equally among his  
sons, so that each may at once have  
his portion. The daughters, although  
present, are not, as a general rule al-  
lowed to inherit any of their father's  
property. In many instances the elder  
son receives a larger portion than the  
younger. The father reserves a sum of  
money, the interest of which he con-  
siders will be sufficient to defray the  
future household expenses of himself  
and wife. At the death of the parents,  
the sum thus reserved does not revert  
to the children, but is set apart for  
the endowment of the ancestral hall.  
Such endowments serve to defray the  
cost of the offerings presented on the  
ancestral altars and at the family  
tombs. They are occasionally used in
