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AUTOMOBILE LOTTERIES

The attention of the public is directed to section 236 of the Criminal Code of Canada which reads in part as follows:—

"236. Lotteries.—Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years' imprisonment and to a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars who—

(a) **Printing Lottery.**—Makes, prints, advertises or publishes, or causes or procures to be made, printed, advertised or published, any proposal, scheme or plan for advancing, lending, giving, selling or in any way disposing of any property, by lots, cards, tickets, or any mode of chance whatsoever; or

(b) **Selling Tickets, etc.**—Sells, barter, exchanges or otherwise disposes of, or causes or procures, or aids or assists in, the sale, barter, exchange or other disposal of, or offers for sale, barter or exchange, any lot, card, ticket or other means or device for advancing, lending, giving, selling or otherwise disposing of any property, by lots, tickets, or any mode of chance whatsoever."

It is to be distinctly understood that September first, next, is the absolute deadline for lotteries in this Province. Some cars were given away by lot this summer, despite these provisions of the Criminal Code, and prosecutions were not proceeded with because of the plea that all arrangements had been made and the cars purchased for such disposal for charitable purposes, but with the distinct understanding that this summer would see the last of such lotteries. Accordingly, the Police have been directed to prosecute without delay any and all violations of this section which come to their attention after September first, 1950.

Walters' best year was 1944 when he won 23 and lost eight for Cincinnati Reds. His last year of active service was in 1948 when the Reds made him coach and eventually manager for part of the season.

McKinney Sells His Share Of Pirates

PITTSBURGH, July 19—(AP)—Frank E. McKinney, Indianapolis banker turned diamond magnate, sold his share of one of baseball's richest gold mines today to two partners.

McKinney resigned as president of Pittsburgh Pirates. His interests were purchased by John Galbreath, a Columbus, O., real estate dealer, and Tom Johnson, Pittsburgh broker.

Galbreath, now principal stockholder of the last-place Bucs, is the new president of the club. Johnson, secretary of the combine which bought the Pirates four years ago, also assumed Galbreath's old duties as treasurer.

The status of the fourth Pittsburgh owner—crooner Bing Crosby—remains unchanged for the present. Crosby, the Buc vice-president, has been offered a portion of McKinney's holdings if he wants it.

In addition to an undisclosed amount of cash, the 46-year-old McKinney regained outright ownership of the Indians club in the American Association. He tossed the Indians into the Pirate pot in August, 1946, when the group bought the Bucs.

Both Galbreath and McKinney indicated Indianapolis will—in effect—continue to be part of the 13-club Pirate farm system.

McKinney explained the sale with this statement: "My business interests and my home are in Indianapolis, and with the present demands being made on my time I find it increasingly difficult to devote the necessary time to my baseball interests in Pittsburgh."

Phillies Plan To Move Farm Teams

PHILADELPHIA, July 20 —(AP)—Philadelphia Phillies plan to move their class "A" Utica, N. Y., franchise and their class-B Wilmington, Del., farm team to other cities because of "staggering financial losses."

Where the two teams will be placed has not yet been decided, a club spokesman announced. But he added that several offers had been received and were under consideration.

How much money the Phils are going to lose by the end of the season at Wilmington and Utica was not revealed but the spokesman indicated it was enough to put the club's entire 12-team farm system substantially in the red.

"We don't expect to make money on our farm system," the spokesman said, "but we would like to break even. We can't build a pennant winner in the National League and stand the terrific losses being incurred at Utica and Wilmington."

Attendance in the two cities has decreased sharply. Whether radio and television had anything to do with the steady decline in fans at the ball park, the spokesman declined to hazard a guess.

Baseball Scout On Maritime Tour

On his first scouting trip to the Maritimes, Shephard will look over prospects in the New Brunswick Baseball League, New Brunswick-Maine League, Halifax and District League, and Cape Breton Colliery League. He is on the lookout for young righthanded hitting outfielders and pitchers.

Shephard just completed working in the Boston area and Maine.

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Text of Statement On War Situation By Prime Minister

OTTAWA, July 20 — (CP) — Following is the text of Prime Minister St. Laurent's statement yesterday on additional Canadian aid to the United Nations forces in Korea:

The attack of the North Korean aggressors on South Korea is a breach in the outer defences of the free world. Each of the free nations has its responsibilities.

So far as Canada is concerned, we have our obligations as a member of the United Nations. We have our obligations under the North Atlantic Treaty. We have our joint responsibility with the United States for the defence of the North American continent.

The resistance to aggression in Korea is to restore peace and to check those aggressive forces which threaten a world war. As an essential step to this, the nations of the free world must examine urgently and carefully where each can make its weight most effectively felt in the overall defence pattern.

The cabinet has had under consideration the communication addressed last Friday by the Secretary-General of the United Nations to the 52 nations which had supported resistance to aggression in Korea. The Secretary-General has asked these governments to consider what assistance they could offer to the United Nations commander.

The cabinet has given full and earnest study to the Secretary-General's request for assistance in the light both of the needs of the Korean situation and of the other interests and responsibilities of Canada.

In this connection, the Cabinet has had before it detailed reports from the three armed services and the advice of the chiefs of staff. We have also been in touch with the civil and military authorities of the United States.

Canadian Destroyers

Already three Canadian destroyers are proceeding to Korean waters. To be prepared for other eventualities, including the requirements for supporting the ships now in the Far East, authority has been given for the navy to place additional ships in commission, to bring others up to full complement, and to recruit whatever additional men are needed.

In making this decision, the Government has kept in mind the well understood role of the Canadian Navy in protecting sea lanes against submarines, mines and

coastal raids. Having in mind the other obligations for the employment of Canadian ground forces, the cabinet has reached the conclusion that the despatch, at this stage, of existing first line elements of the Canadian Army to the Korean theatre would not be warranted.

However, with a view to strengthening the Canadian Army to meet future requirements the cabinet has authorized recruiting above present ceilings and the acceleration of other aspects of the Army program.

International Council

Should a decision be taken by the Security Council of the United Nations to recruit an international force for service, under the U.N. commander, in Korea, the Canadian Government will give immediate consideration to Canadian participation in such an undertaking. Any participation of this nature would require approval by Parliament in accordance with my statement made in the House of Commons June 30.

It has been indicated to the Government that transport by air is an immediate need. The Government has, therefore, decided to provide at once a long-range R.C.A.F. transport squadron for service in the Pacific air lift.

The program for increasing the operational strength of the R.C.A.F. is being accelerated. Canadian aircraft production is being speeded up, and additional personnel will be recruited and trained.

The Korean situation cannot be viewed in isolation. The attack on the republic of Korea has increased the cohesion of resistance to aggressive Communism in other parts of the world.

The measures which the United States Government have taken and are taking are far-reaching and significant.

Here in Canada we also shall press on with measures which will increase the preparedness of this country.

We are increasing immediately our defence effort and expenditure. We are also giving consideration to further measures of aid by this country to our North Atlantic partners.

Grave decisions may lie ahead but it is deeply sustaining to know that the well-nigh unanimous weight of Canadian public opinion is behind the Government in its decision that Canada do its share in resisting aggression and restoring peace.

Dynamiter Dies From Explosion

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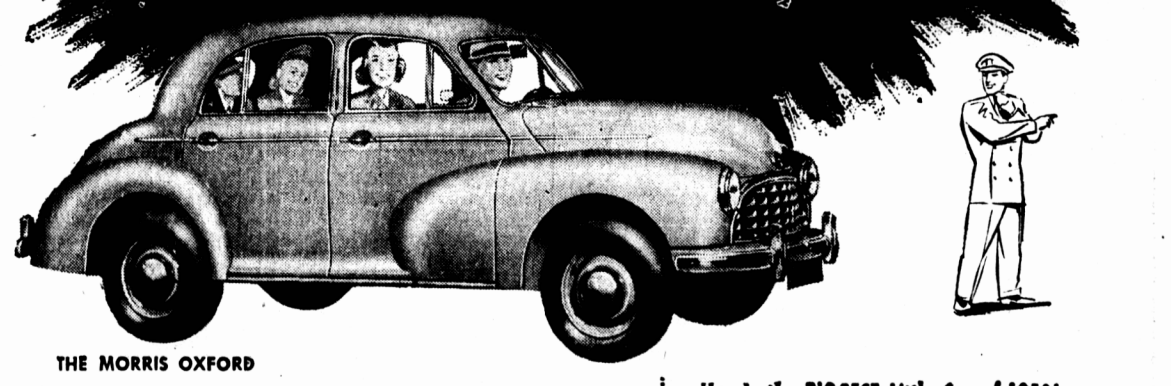
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
