

Mark 150 Anniversary Of Presbyterian Congregations

On Sunday, August 12th, at 2.30 p.m. outside the historic Geddie Memorial Church of the New London Pastoral charge, New London, P. E. I., there was held a memorial service to commemorate the first Presbyterian service and sermon in the New London area.

Although the weather threatened for the worship service held on the steps of the Geddie church with the congregation, either sitting on the grass, or in their cars, or standing on the lawn. There was an estimated 450 people present.

This service was held under the direct supervision of the elders of the New London pastoral charge of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, who were counseled by the committee of two: Rev. E.H. Bean, B.A., B. Th., B.D., and Rev. L.D. Bartlett, B.A., B.D., who had been appointed by the presbytery to work out plans and conduct this service.

under the leadership of Dr. J. MacGregor of Picton, N.S. Dr. MacGregor spent several weeks on the island, preaching and teaching the word of God and the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This service was held in the New London pastoral charge in 1806 was the beginning of Presbyterianism in that area. There was no organized service before this. The first organized church and congregation came into being in the year 1816 at the site of the Yankee Hill cemetery. At the suggestion of the Presbytery and Rev. E.H.
