I have a real sympathy with my young schoolboy friends who teachers impose upon them the duty of writing an essay upon some subject.

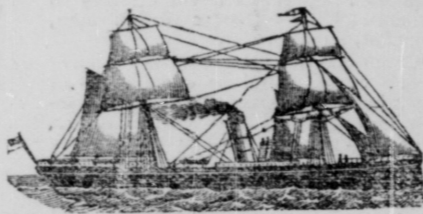
"Clumbus was a man who could make an egg stand on end without breaking it. The King of Spain said to Columbus, 'Can you discover America?'"
