

MISCELLANEOUS.

Queen Victoria is to visit Germany in the spring.

Prince Bismarck and Henry W. Longfellow have been elected honorary members of the Royal Historical Society of England.

Another Arctic expedition along the northern coast of Asia, starting from the Pacific, and proceeding thence towards the Atlantic, has been inaugurated by Sibirikoff.

The Princess Louise is still confined to her bed from the effects of the late accident. It is said that the injuries from which she is suffering is of a more serious character than at first reported.

A petition has been received at Ottawa from Montreal merchants and manufacturers, asking that the Insolvent Law should not be repealed without a provision being made for the equitable distribution of estates.

RISE IN PAPER.—The Coburg *Sentinel* says:—The price of paper has been advanced. If this price is maintained, the public will be compelled to pay more for their newspapers. Many daily papers have already increased their price from twenty to thirty cents per week, and weekly papers from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per year. Three months' saving of rags and old paper by the entire population, and selling them in the markets, would check the advance in paper. Rags are worth three to three and one-half cents per pound. Every newspaper in the land should appeal to the people in this matter, and they should also economize in the consumption as much as possible.

Speaking of the oddities of selfishness, *Macmillan's Magazine* tells the following: Most amusing are the strange fancies that some persons have as to what overworked men may be asked to do for them. In the very thick of the American war there came to President Lincoln an Illinois farmer in a great state of excitement about a pair of horses that one of Lincoln's Generals had requisitioned for the war. The owner was, of course, entitled to compensation, but somehow it had not come. Going to the President he told him his story, and was rather chagrined to be told that it did not lie with him to pay the money. 'Then,' says the farmer, 'will you undertake to write to the General and see that the matter is settled properly?' Poor Lincoln, who never wanted for a story to help him in an emergency, was ready for his visitor. 'When I was a rail-splitter,' he said, 'there lived near us a smart young fellow, the Captain of a Mississippi boat, who could steer a vessel over the rapids with wonderful skill, as hardly any one else could. One day, when he was grasping the wheel with his utmost strength, at the most critical point of the rapids, a little boy came running up to him in great excitement, and said 'Cap'n stop your ship, my apple has fallen overboard!'

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, Feb. 27.

The *Standard* is informed that, in consequence of a telegram from Parnell, Mr. Biggar, Home Ruler, has resolved to disregard the wishes of the moderate Home Rulers, and oppose, with the utmost resistance, in detail, the obstruction resolutions.

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.

Eighteen hundred Irish immigrants arrived here yesterday.

A Dublin despatch says that the *Freeman's Journal* denounces Parnell's attack on the Mansion House Committee and the Duchess of Marlborough, as an outrage.

PARIS, Feb. 27.

The *Moniteur* announces the arrest of a Prussian officer while taking views of Bessu redoubts. He was conveyed to Rheims.

Letters from the best sources state that Prince Hohenlohe, German Ambassador to Paris, was summoned to Berlin, not only to vote on the Army Bill, but to have a post created for him combining the functions of Foreign Minister with other existing functions, and, consequently, Hohenlohe will not return here.

LONDON, Feb. 27.

A boat, containing part of the crew of the steamer *Manitoba*, disabled, has arrived at Balley Catton, Ireland. It left the ship anchored thirty miles off the coast, awaiting assistance.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.

The oil refiners deputation yesterday had an interview with the Minister of Inland Revenue. The Morrisburg deputation arrived last night, and will have an interview with the Minister of Railways to-day. They want the Williamsburg Canal enlarged.

Yesterday the Ontario boundary committee met. The report of a murder trial in 1813, which had a bearing on the boundary dispute, was read. Colonel Dennis will be examined on Tuesday.

There is much interest among New Brunswickers here, concerning the possible removal of the seat of Government to St. John.

In reply to Mr. McKenzie to day, Sir Samuel Tilley said it would depend upon when very important returns asked for were ready, when the estimates would be brought down, probably not before the middle of next week.

Sir Richard Cartwright said this side would do without the returns for the present if they got the budget.

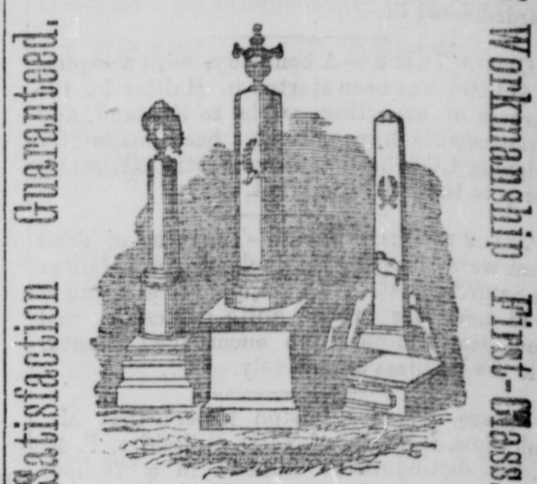
