Vuozzo, in the Meteor goal, played a spectacular game as he turned the tide time and again from what looked like sure goals.

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IN MEMORIAM

BENJAMIN CLOW

Murray Harbor North was called upon to mourn the death on Sunday, October 28th, 1951, of Benjamin Clow, one of the community's oldest and most highly esteemed citizens.

Born at Murray Harbor North on May 17, 1859, he was the eldest son of the late James Clow and Lucy Graham, and was the last surviving member of that family. Two sisters, Mary, (Mrs. F. J. Hoyt), and Margaret, (Mrs. J. Leslie Poole), and one brother, Stephen, New York City, predeceased him several years ago.

An adopted brother, William, passed away in the same month as the deceased. Two nieces also reside in the U. S. A. They are Ella, (Mrs. John McCormack) of East Boston, and Lucy, (Mrs. L. G. Crooks) of Watertown.

On May 27, 1891, he was married to Katherine McLean, daughter of the late James McLean and Margaret Johnston. To this union were born four children, Stella (Mrs. L. W. Murdoch), James, George and Jean, all of whom reside on the homestead, and tenderly cared for their father in the event of his life, and now mourn the loss of their beloved father.

His wife predeceased him December 9, 1948. The late Mr. Clow was, with the exception of several years spent in Boston, Massachusetts, a lifelong resident of Murray Harbor North, and was a generous supporter in affairs of church and community. He was favorably known in local shipping centres and took a keen interest in the sailing vessels. Trips taken with the various sea captains were a source of great pleasure to him.

As a young man he went into business with his father, who was a prosperous farmer and merchant. After his father's demise he continued to operate a general store for some years. The business was later taken over by his sons. The deceased also owned and operated a lobster factory and was known in his own community and elsewhere as an enterprising business man.

Possessed of many sterling qualities, he was upright and honest in character, kind and obliging in disposition, courteous and affable in his demeanour to all. His home was ever a place of gracious hospitality for his many friends and neighbors, and today stands as a silent monument to one whose name will long be cherished in the community in which he lived.

Retired from active work for some years, he had reached his 92nd milestone, yet he seemed not to grow old with the years, and always, took a keen interest in the home and current topics of the day.

Two months previous to his death he entered the King's County Memorial Hospital, Montague, for observation and treatment. During his illness the family's visits were never failing and their ministries thoughtful and helpful.

Despite medical aid and tender nursing, it became evident that God was soon to call him to his heavenly home and on the above mentioned date he fell asleep in Jesus, with that blessed assurance that the Lord Jesus Christ saves, keeps and satisfies those who put their trust in Him.

Also left to mourn their loss are a loving daughter-in-law and three grandchildren who were very dear to him. They are Florence (Mrs. Grant Sencabaugh) who was very devoted to her grandfather, Gail and Myrna Clow. There are also six great grandchildren.

That he was highly respected by people in all walks of life was evident by the large attendance at his funeral which was held from his late residence on October 30th. The impressive service was conducted by Rev. Norman Young, Montague. Taking for his text, 1st Cor. 15 verse 55, "O death where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?" he spoke words of comfort to the bereaved family.

Hymns sung were favorites of the deceased. "The Lord's My Shepherd" (St. Martin's), "When the Roll is Called up Yonder" and "Jesus Saviour Pilot Me". Pallbearers were: Albert McLeod, Sr., William McLean, John Clow, Wilbert Sencabaugh, James Henderson and Webster Clow. Interment was in the Murray Harbor North cemetery.

Wightman residence at Lower Montague and was the daughter of the late Captain Joseph Wightman and Annie Cameron Peters. Her grandfather was the late Hon. Joseph Alexander Wightman, one of the Island's leading statesmen of his day. He had come from Dumfriesshire, Scotland, and was one of the first settlers in King's County, and was an outstanding business man owning a shipyard, vessels and general stores.

Two of Mrs. Adolphe's uncles, Dr. John Wightman and Dr. James Wightman were surgeons in the American Civil War. Her maternal grandfather was Mr. George A. Peters, formerly of England.

Mrs. Adolphe was twice married. Her first husband was the late Daniel J. Stewart. Their home "Hazeltree" dispensed hospitality to all the countryside. Mr. and Mrs. Stewart were well-known horticulturists being among the first to develop the gladioli in this province. People came from great distances to see their garden. Mrs. Stewart was noted for her generosity with her fruit and flowers.

Mr. and Mrs. Stewart took into their home a little brother and sister, giving them care and affection. The son is now residing in Boston, Mass. The daughter predeceased Mrs. Stewart.

The funeral services were held at the McLean Funeral Home, Rev. H. E. D. Ashford conducted the service. Miss Lena McLure sang very effectively "Good Night and Good Morning" by Rev. Roddover. Mrs. Keith Rogers was the organist.

Mrs. Ashford spoke very understandingly of the deceased. One incident he mentioned as being symbolic of her character was that during a recent visit at the hospital he told her he was sorry he could not call more often. "Oh," came the quick considerate reply, "there are so many who need you more than I."

The service at the Lower Montague Church was conducted by Rev. A. D. MacKenzie. The choir sang "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" and "Abide With Me". She was tenderly laid to rest in the Lower Montague cemetery besides the remains of her late husband D. J. Stewart.
