**TIMING A SQUEEZE**

The difficult feature of squeeze plays is in their timing. For example, South automatically reached a squeeze position in today's deal, and there was no other chance for the contract, but the order in which he played his last six cards was fatal.

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:

North, of course, would have had an easy time of it at notrump, but South had some hope of a slam and felt that at least five diamonds should be safe.

West made an inspired opening lead for his side—the ace and then the ten of hearts. East ruffed dummy's queen and returned the Jack of clubs. South won with the ace, drew trumps, and led another round for good measure—so that this was now the position:

South led a low club to the king, and saw the break. When West discarded a spade, the club eight was returned from dummy, to South's queen, and West let go another spade. Now South cashed his last trump—but to no good effect. West had to bank his spade queen, to protect his hearts, but East could hold K-10 of spades over dummy, and there was no squeeze.

Now observe the vast difference if declarer, after leading to the club king, had simply cashed the high heart! East could safely discard a spade at this point, but he would soon be in trouble! Now when South led a club to his queen and then cashed the last trump, West would again have to blank his own spade queen, to keep the high heart. Thereupon, dummy would throw away the heart, keeping the A-J of spades—and it would be East's turn! He would either have to blank his spade king, letting South catch the ace and jack; or, by jettisoning the club ten, permit South to cash his own low club.
