

# Junior Hockey League May Play Outside CAHA

MOOSE JAW, Sask. (CP)—The Canadian Major Junior Hockey League, embracing seven teams in Alberta and Saskatchewan, may play outside the rules and regulations of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association this season.

The league meets today in Regina to discuss refusal by the CAHA during the weekend to grant the league affiliation.

CMJHL commissioner Frank Boucher, of Regina, said in a telephone interview Tuesday that as far as he was concerned the CAHA is discriminating against junior hockey in Alberta and Saskatchewan and the only alternative seems to be to play outside CAHA regulations.

The new junior league is operated by a board of governors comprised of franchise holders: Edmonton, Calgary, from each of the seven league

Saskatoon, Regina, Moose Jaw, Weyburn and Estevan.

Following a meeting Sunday in Toronto, the CAHA executive confirmed a decision made in July by its executive committee ruling the league unacceptable to the association.

The CAHA directed its Saskatchewan branch to continue to operate the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League with the same members as last season. The CAHA ruled that during the 1966-67 season no league would be formed that would include teams from both Saskatchewan and Alberta.

The new league earlier received permission to form from the Alberta and Saskatchewan branches, which under CAHA regulations have right to do so.

"The CAHA has over-ruled the two branches on a decision

which they are entitled to make," Boucher said, "and as far as I am concerned, the CAHA is discriminating against junior hockey in the two branches."

**REFERS TO OTHERS**

He said the Western Canada Senior Hockey League engages in inter-provincial play under the same rule the Canadian Major Hockey League was formed. The Ontario Hockey Association junior series also permits Montreal Canadiens to play in the league under the same regulations.

Replying to a statement Monday in Calgary by Stu Peppard, president of the Alberta branch, that the CAHA seeks to eliminate inter-provincial leagues next season, Boucher said, "the CAHA is trying to take hockey back 40 years behind its times."

"We have told the CAHA a dozen times we would play outside of its control if the executive refused to recognize affiliation."

The league is scheduled to open play Friday with three games.

Plans released two weeks ago called for a 56-game schedule for each team.

# Scotsman Must Wear 5 Heads To Match Crowns

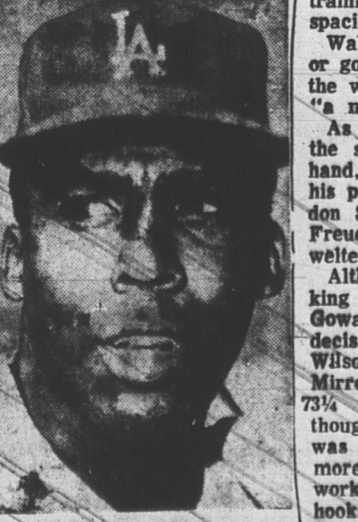

# It's Drysdale Against Bird's McNally In First Tomorrow

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Don Drysdale, the No. 2 boy of Los Angeles Dodgers' pitching royalty, will face 23-year-old Dave McNally of the underdog Baltimore Orioles in the World Series opener today at Dodger Stadium.

A sellout crowd of 55,000 will watch the opener, scheduled for 4 p.m. EDT. There is a chance of showers.

The Dodgers, who won the National League pennant in the last game of the baseball season, are favored 8-5 to beat the hard-hitting Orioles who breezed to the American League title almost two weeks ago.

"The guys that make those odds never played baseball," said manager Hank Bauer of the Orioles. "Anything can happen in a World Series. Usually the guy who doesn't figure to do anything has the big series. I know, it happened in my case."

**IN TENTH SERIES**

The Orioles, of course, are in their first series but this will be No. 10 for Bauer, a New York Yankee regular in their days of glory. Bauer played with seven winners and only two losers as a Yankee.

McNally, a fast-balling lefty with a 13-6 record, gets the call in the opener because Bauer figures a southpaw pitcher is more effective against the speedy Dodgers, who have stolen 92 bases.

Bauer has platooned at several positions during the regular season, but expects to shift only his centre fielder in this series. Russ Snyder will play against Drysdale and any right-handed pitcher. Paul Blalock will be in there against lefties, like Sandy Koufax in the second game.

Manager Walter Alston of the Dodgers will follow Drysdale (13-16) with Koufax (27-9) and Claude Osteen (17-14) in that order. Jim Palmer (15-10), Baltimore's top winner, will oppose Koufax Thursday and Wally Bunker (10-6) will open for the

# Toronto Varsity Revived By Metropolitan Lawyer

TORONTO (CP) — It has been a long time between Grads hockey team — more seasons for the Varsity Grads hockey team — more than 38 years.

The club, made up of graduates of the University of Toronto, last played in 1928 when they swept the Olympic championships in St. Moritz, Switzerland.

The resurrected Grads, formed by a group of businessmen headed by lawyer Joe Kane, will be based in the Toronto suburb of North York and will play in the Ontario Hockey Association senior series.

"The nucleus of the team will be university graduates living in the Toronto area," says Kane, a former hockey coach at the U. of T.

But unlike their predecessors, the new Grads will have players from several universities and some who never went to college.

If tradition means anything, the present-day Grads should do well. The University of Toronto swept to three consecutive intercollegiate titles starting in 1924 and twice reached the Allan Cup finals, losing to Port Arthur in 1925 and 1926.

The team remained intact after most of the players finished school and, as the Varsity Grads, won the Allan Cup in 1927, defeating Port William in a tough series in Vancouver.

**WENT TO OLYMPICS**

The victory earned them a trip to the 1928 Olympics which they won easily, drubbing Sweden 11-0, England 14-0 and Switzerland 3-0.

Grads were coached by Conn Smythe, who was later to build Toronto Maple Leafs into a hockey power. Their manager was W. A. (Billy) Hewitt, the sportsman who died Sept. 11.

Most of the players went on to successful careers in business and the professions, almost all of them in Toronto.

Dr. Joe Sullivan, the goaltender, is a prominent ear specialist who was appointed to the Senate by John Diefenbaker in 1957.

On defence were Jack (Red) Porter, the team captain, now a director of a large department store chain, and Ross Taylor, a lawyer.

Hugh Plaxton was at centre and his brothers Bert and the late Roger Plaxton were substitutes. Hugh went on to play for Montreal Maroons of the National Hockey League and now practises law with Bert.

Dr. Louis Hudson, now of Timmins, Ont., was at right wing and the late Dave Trotter, left wing. Trotter, Eastern Canada representative for an oil company, died in Halifax three years ago.

Rounding out the team were Grant Gordon, who died three years ago after a law career, Joe Sullivan's brother Frank, who also played for Toronto Granites when they won the Allan Cup in 1921, the late Stuffy Mueller, a lawyer, Charlie Delahay, now in the auto business, and Frank Fisher, a businessman.

**TEACHERS ON TEAM**

Kane plans to invite former Grads to become honorary directors of the new club, the first Senior A team in Toronto since 1950 when Marlborough won the Allan Cup.

The team has about 30 prospects working out, most of them teachers, lawyers, law students, accountants, doctors and dentists. They play their first exhibition game against Tulsa Oilers of the Central pro league Oct. 1.

# Canadiens Take Second Game

MINOTON (CP) — Houston Apollos stayed with Montreal Canadiens for two periods here Tuesday night but wilted in the third to lose an exhibition hockey game 7-4 before a crowd of 5,500.

The Apollos, a Central Professional League Farm Team of the National Hockey League, Canadiens, led twice in the game, but gave up three unanswered goals to the defending Stanley Cup champions in the third period.

Houston led 3-2 after the first period on goals by Bill Inglis, Danny Grant and Jim Patterson. Jacques LaPerriere and Jean Beliveau scored for Montreal.

The teams were tied 4-4 going into the third after second-period goals by Houston's Jacques LeMaire and Montreal's Ralph Backstrom and Bobby Rousseau.

Third-period scorers for the Canadiens were Henri Richard, Dave Balon and Gilles Tremblay.

The teams left immediately after the game for Montreal by train.

It was the second pre-season game between the two clubs in two nights. In Halifax Monday, the Canadiens swamped the Apollos.
