SHIPPING LIVE LOBSTERS.—The Archat Warden says: The experiment of shipping live lobsters from Archat to Boston, has proved a success. Although the lobsters had been caught on Friday and did not arrive in Boston until the next Thursday afternoon, yet, when put on the market, over three quarters of the shipment were still alive and in good marketable condition. More and larger shipments will follow.

CHARGED WITH FRAUD.—Pryor H. Eisnor was charged in the police court yesterday with fraudulently converting to his own use 10 barrels of ham, bacon and pork of Samuel Wheatley, on April 12th, 1892. He denies the charge, in fact, claiming that he never had the goods in his possession, and never was bailee of Wheatley. The difficulty arose out of an agreement with Wheatley to raise \$200 for their mutual accommodation. It is claimed that Eisnor sold the articles when he had no right to do so under the warehouse receipt. J. T. Ross is acting for Wheatley, and Mr. Troop for Eisnor.—Halifax Herald.

LIGHTNING IN NEW BRUNSWICK.—The electrical storm of Thursday evening was very severe in New Brunswick. The lightning was exceedingly vivid and the rain fell in floods. At Upper Woodstock, two Briggs' barns were unroofed and Harry Gidding had one of his cows crushed like an egg-shell. At Grafton, Moses McDonald's barn was demolished, as also was one of a Mr. McLearn, on Connel road. John Scott, of Hartford, had one of the finest barns in the country containing upwards of 75 tons of hay struck by lightning and completely consumed. The fine of the Wilberg house at Woodstock was struck by lightning and badly shattered. The electric current ran down to the range in the kitchen, scattering utensils about but fortunately injuring no one. The house of Frank Siddall, at Westport, was struck and destroyed by lightning and burned down. Gagetown was also visited by the storm and considerable damage was done. The dwelling of J. McKenna was struck and a large amount of plaster torn off. No one was injured. A barn belonging to J. Deverber near Sackville, was struck by lightning and touched on the ear by the lightning and killed instantly. Other damage was done in different localities in the district.
