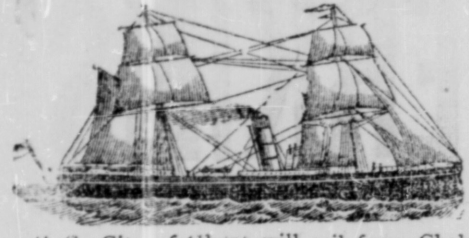

## FOR THE WOMEN

Extravagance in shoes is carried to great extremes, the American woman, like the French, priding herself on her extremities, and the care with which she dresses them. Men supply themselves even more liberally, and nothing is so surprising to the inexperienced person as a glance at varied assortments of shoes which make up the wardrobe of some of our men.

### Short Skirts.

Short skirts are in evidence to an amazing extent. You see them on trains, boats, in hotel dining rooms and on city streets. They are not bicycle skirts or golf skirts, but have been made for travelling, shopping and the general utility business by the most excellent tailors. Doublefaced cloth is used for them almost invariably, and the check or plain surface is on the outside, according to the taste of the wearer. Many of the skirts are made so that either side may be turned outward at will. It must be confessed that the effects of this general abbreviation are not altogether pleasing, says the Philadelphia North American.

sand-paper to take off the worst of the roughness. Rub thoroughly with olive oil, and let the article stand forty-eight hours. At the end of this time rub again with oil, and then with finely powdered, unslaked lime. Kerosene may be used instead of olive oil. This will prove effectual unless the article is very badly eaten; then I know of nothing that will restore the brightness. When one has nice steel knives, not in constant use, it is a good plan, before putting them away, to have them thoroughly dried, and then to wipe the blades with an oiled cloth.—The House-hold.

In the growing popularity of gas or electric heaters it should not be forgotten that oil stoves have kept pace with the progress of their latest competitors. In many places in the country it is possible only to use an oil stove, and they are still more economical even where gas is to be had. Some of them now on the market burn with a blue flame, like that of gas, and their manufacturers have succeeded in making the flame odorless and producing a full flame at the moment of lighting.

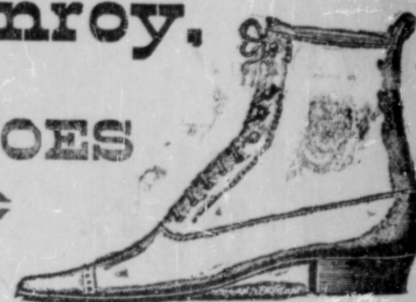
