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Rothme Fires Amazing Round

HALIFAX (CP) — Bob Rothme, 33-year-old professional from Brantford, Ont., gave the big-name players something to shoot at Wednesday when he breezed around the Caburn Club course in a two-under-par 66 in an early preliminary round to the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association championship.

An all-pro field of 49 set out in the special competition that preceded the later pro-amateur round.

Many of the favorites for the 84-hole CPGA championship that gets under way today played in the later event, but the early show at least was stolen by Rothme.

Lesser-known kept to the fore in the early preliminary round. Behind Rothme were three Maritime pros: veteran Pete Kelly of Fredericton, with 67; John Munroe of Amherst, with 68; and Jim Walker of Moncton, with 69.

Rothme, who won \$100 in the special event, attributed his fine game to his irons play, backed up by two practice rounds of 66 and 70. His card showed 30 putts, 14 on the front nine, and 16 on the back stretch.
