DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Supernation of Judges.

OTTAWA, March 15.

Sir Hector Langevin yesterday, replying to a question of Mr. L. H. Davies said that it was the intention of the Government, to bring in a measure during the present session, for the purpose of applying the supernation Statute to the Judges of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island.

Improvement to Summerside Harbor.

Mr. Backett, yesterday, moved for a copy of the Survey of Summerside Harbor. Speaking on the motion, he urged the erection of a breakwater in the harbor as soon as possible.

Relating to Corporations.

Mr. Weldon, yesterday introduced a bill relating to corporations, indicted for misdemeanors.

Egan's Arrival.

NEW YORK, March 15.

Patrick Egan arrived here yesterday. He denies being connected with the Invincibles. He says that the stories circulated regarding the Land League Funds will be promptly attended to. It is his intention to be present at the Convention of the Irish National Land League, which will shortly be held in Philadelphia. Egan in an interview with a Sun reporter said that the Castle officials have conspired to convict innocent men whom they accuse of plotting to murder high officials. To this end the minor officials of the British Government and others are placed on the stand and bribed to give the necessary evidence, and prisoners are not given any chance to arrange for a defence.

Parnell's Land Act Amendment Rejected.

LONDON, March 15.

In the House of Commons yesterday, the amendments submitted to the Land Act by Mr. Parnell were rejected. They were strongly opposed by Mr. Gladstone.

Telegraph Notes.

Frank Byrne intends going to the United States, where he will settle down.

Business in all departments in England is much injured by the Arctic weather. The intense cold has put a stop to farming operations.

At a meeting of 21 delegates, representing South Yorkshire and Lancaster iron trades, it was resolved to restrict the output of finished iron.

Lord Granville, in the House of Lords, the other night, admitted the Government's intention to conclude a treaty with Portugal to promote freedom of navigation and commerce on Congo. This is precisely what France, under pretext of the DeBrazza Treaty, is striving to prevent.

Patrick Levy, aged 28, was arrested on the Sabaria, which arrived at Boston on the 12th, on a charge of having killed Patrick Hurley, a farmer, living in Mullingar, Wexmouth County, Ireland, in March, 1881. Levy confessed to the officers of the ship just after leaving Queenstown.

The total number of persons arrested in London for complicity in the anarchist movements is 1200. Of this number 300 are charged with murders, agrarian outrages and with being abettors of the "Black Flag" society. Six of the prisoners have confessed their complicity in four murders.

The field-marshalship conferred by the Emperor of Germany upon the Prince of Wales, though partly a personal compliment to a member of his own family, is not without political significance. The Berlin Government keeps a sharp eye on Anglo-French differences and is perfectly willing to see them increase.

A house, twelve miles south of Helena, Ark., in which were six adults and four children, was upset by the flood and the children were drowned. Others were rescued after they had clung to the roof for three days. The St. Francis swamps contain hundreds of horses, mules and cattle standing up to their throats in water. Many carcasses are floating about.

The channel tunnel is vigorously agitated, with a view of securing Government favor. In the bore made on the French side, engineers have shown, by experiment, that they can proceed to Dover at the rate of 32 feet daily. This would complete a gallery 33 feet wide, the whole way across, in a little over eighteen months. French enthusiasm on the subject makes no account of English opposition.

Hood & Scott's lodging house at Brown's wood camp, near Deadwood, D. T., terminus of the Black Hills & Fort Pierre Railroad, was burned on the 12th and James Chalmers, Thomas Finless, R. C. Wright, Peter Hanson, A. T. Tenneliff, Harvey Wood, W. H. Andrews, Charles Hammontry, Fred T. Peters and Samuel Hays were burned to death. Four others whose names are not learned, were seriously injured. The origin of the fire is not known.

The roof of the northwestern wing of the Grand Theatre, Havana, crushed through the entrance into the coffee house below on the 13th. It is supposed that a majority of the persons who were in the coffee house escaped. The unsafe condition of the wall, and the fact that rain was falling in torrents prevented workmen from immediately clearing away the rubbish. Among several dead persons taken from the ruins is Enrique Gonzalez, co-proprietor of the theatre. Several families living in the entresol escaped miraculously, taking refuge on the balconies.

The N. Y. Tribune's London cable letter says that Gladstone's re-appearance in the House of Commons marks the beginning of the serious business of the session. Everybody here has heretofore felt the want of authority and definite direction in the public affairs, Hartington leading the House with judgment, but being unable to give decisive answers to important questions and sometimes going quite wrong, as in his handling of the English troops which he withdrew from Egypt within six

months. The unhappy slip, though partly corrected by the Earl of Granville in the House of Lords, excited lively alarm in Egypt and in London.

Parnellite attacks upon the Government continue in the House of Commons and elsewhere. O'Brien, on Thursday, declared that Trevelyan was deserving of execration in Ireland. Trevelyan replied that O'Brien's newspaper, successively attacked, with singular ferocity, Forster, Burke, Justice Lawson and Juror Field and asked the House to remember the connecting link between these four was the same paper, which now attacked himself, as the man most hated in Ireland and as more inhuman and destitute of feeling than Forster. [This remark Parnell boldly cheered.] He never would withhold one word because criticism led to violence.
