According to an English statistician the population of England and Wales doubles in about 50 years; in Sweden in 60 years; in Prussia in 64; in Spain in 93, in Italy in 100, and in France in only 261.

For some time past an immense number of cattle have been passing over the Grand Trunk Railway, mostly for shipment to England. On Sunday last five trains passed down, one of which contained 91 head of fancy cattle, whose average weight was 1,900 pounds each.

The Statue of Hercules, in the Tuileries Garden, Paris, has been without a big toe for a quarter of a century, although every inspector of Fine Arts implored to have the damage repaired; this has now been done at a cost of 11 francs.

The six steamers that sailed from New York for Europe, on Saturday, took out immense cargoes. They carried in the aggregate 255,800 bushels of grain, 26,600 boxes of cheese, 4,400 boxes of bacon, 5,300 bbls. of flour, 10,650 pkgs. of butter, 868 bales of cotton, and 641 hds. of tobacco, besides large amounts of fresh and salted meat, tallow, oil cake and other produce.

The attitude of the parties in France towards each other on the eve of the elections is not reassuring. It is to be hoped that no blood will be shed, and no revolutionary courses adopted by either of the parties, but the present aspect of affairs does not give much ground for such hopes.

Richard L. Harthshorne, publisher of the original "American Lloyds Register," was held in \$500 bail in New York the other day by Justice Bixby, charged with publishing a pamphlet containing libels against Thomas D. Taylor, publisher of the "American Lloyds Universal Standard Record of Shipping."

The monster dived immediately, displaying great agility. About 16 or 18 feet of the tail end was distinctly seen, being only two or three feet below the surface. The body was of a greenish color.

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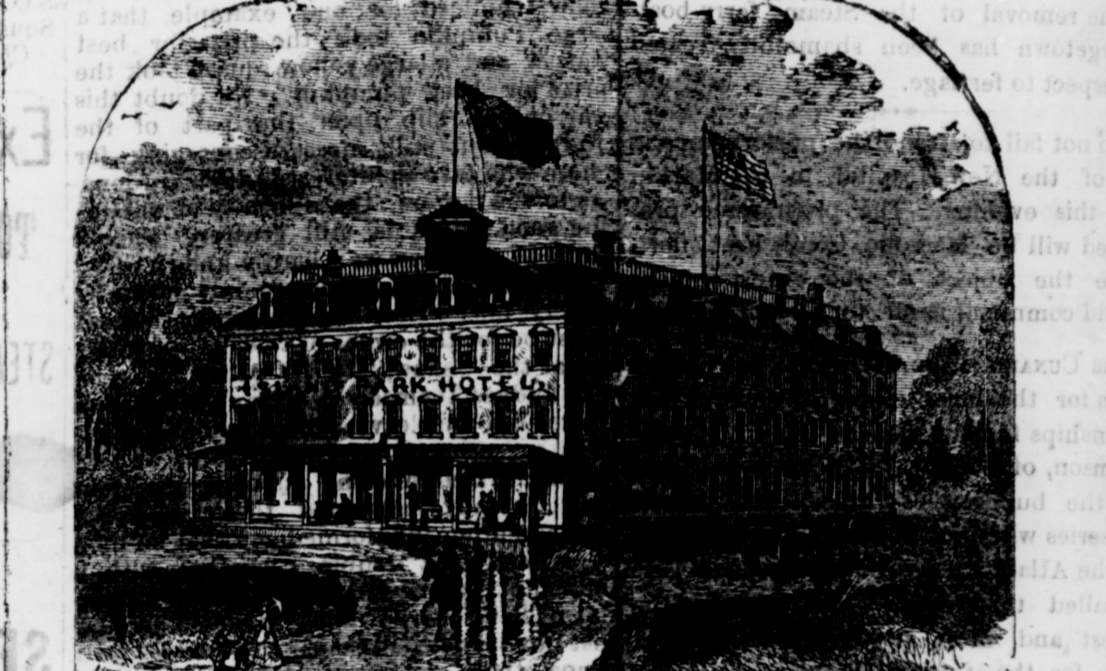
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P. E. ISLAND SUMMER RESORT.
