

Legionaire Says Some Grave Marks 'Disgrace'

SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Legion Branch was host to the East Prince zone meeting held Wednesday evening at which all branches were represented.

The new provincial president, Zone Commander, P.C. Martin, of Miscouche, P.E.I., presided.

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Comrade Jack MacIsaac, Borden, was in attendance and addressed the gathering briefly pledging the support of Provincial Command to all zones.

Discussion centered on three main topics, legion funerals, a veteran's ward at Prince County Hospital and legion sponsored track and field meets.

Comrade Roland Phillipson told the meeting that all deceased veterans should have grave markers of equal distinction. He stated that at present veterans without financial means were buried under the last post and had markers which were identified as being supplied by the paupers fund. Mr. Phillipson said this was a disgrace, not only to the veteran but to the legion as well.

As a result, a committee was appointed to draw up a resolution regarding this issue to be presented to Provincial Command requesting action.

FAVOUR WARD

Comrade Emery Richard of Borden reported that the Prince County Hospital authorities were in favor of a veterans ward, and the matter had been dealt with several times.

He said however, the department of veterans affairs appeared not to be in favor. The hospital manager J.M. Logan said he would bring the matter up again at the next meeting of the hospital board and report back to Mr. Richard.

President of the Summerside branch, Comrade Ben Champion, asked for greater effort by each branch in organizing track and field meets, which would be followed by zone and later by Provincial meets.

He referred to the \$20,000 spent this year on the Canadian Legion Sports Training Program and added that this was only the beginning.

Mr. Champion said that each branch must sponsor and encourage track and field if the money spent is to be of any real benefit.

SUMMERSIDE — A Prince Edward Island native has been appointed agent for the Canadian National Railways express department at Summerside.

He is Arthur W. Tredelek, native of West Devon and formerly express agent at Pictou, N.S. He succeeds A.M. Robinson, recently promoted to the post of express agent at Charlottetown.

Mr. Tredelek entered the express department service at Charlottetown in 1942. In 1944 he joined the Royal Canadian Navy, returning to CN express in March of 1946 as a general clerk at Charlottetown.

He was appointed express agent at Shelburne, N.B., in 1955. The following year he was transferred to Springfield Junction in the same capacity and in 1957 was appointed agent at Pictou.

Mr. Tredelek's appointment was announced by Neil MacLellan of Moncton, superintendent of the CNR express department in the Atlantic region.

Town Council Will Discuss Fluoridation

SUMMERSIDE — The touchy question of fluoridation, first considered by the Summerside Town Council three years ago, is expected to get a thorough airing at the Council's October meeting.

Councillor Dr. H.E. Clark has received considerable literature on fluoridation of water supplies and this will be discussed along with the recommendations of provincial health authorities.

Fluoridation has received the support of the P.E.I. Medical Society, P.E.I. Dental Society and the P.E.I. Department of Public Health.

Charlottetown's City Council went on record earlier this month as approving fluoridation for the city's water supplies and has recommended speedy action on the matter to the Commission of Sewers and Water Supply.

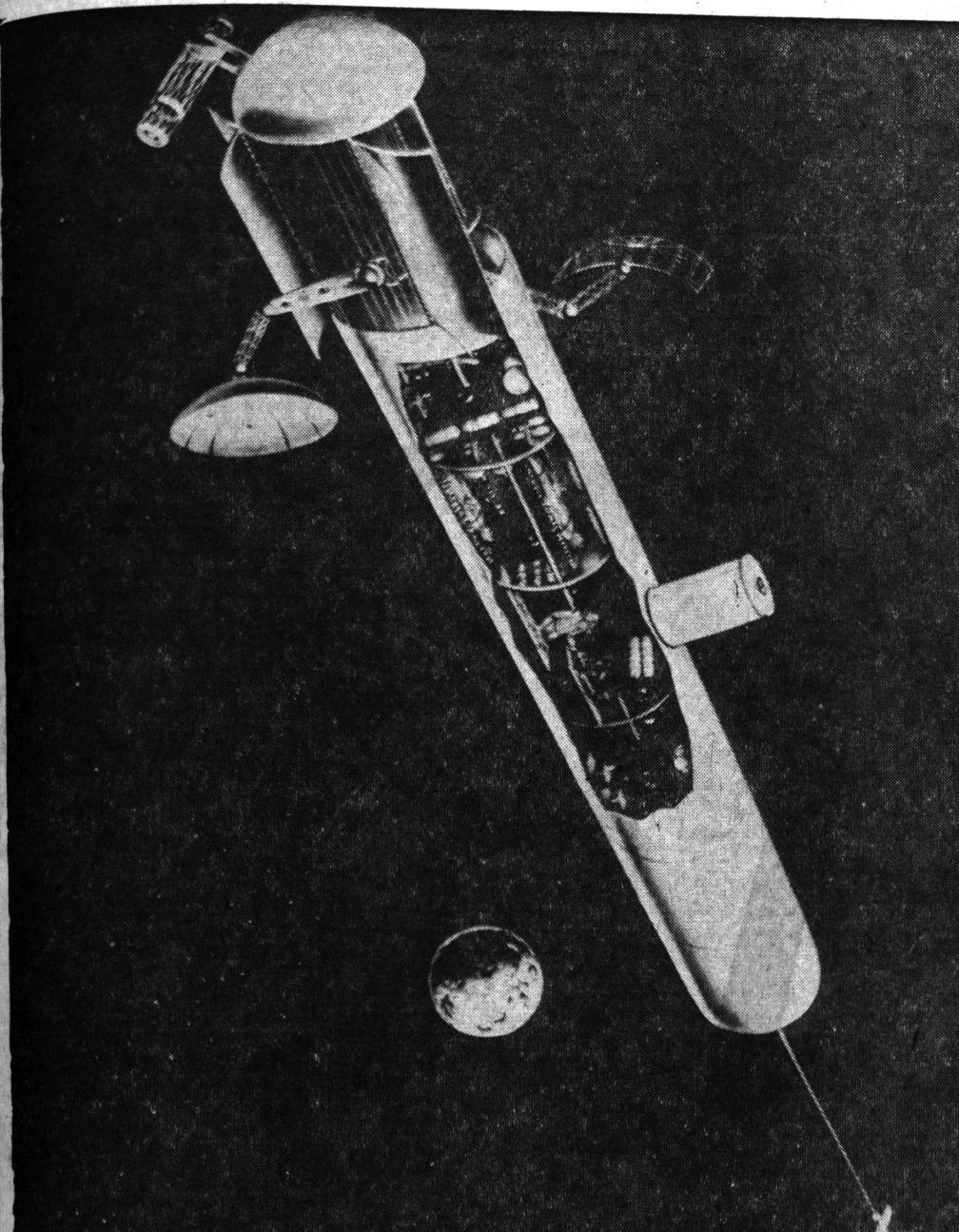

Says Revised Liquor Laws Would Help Tourist Trade

INGONISH, N.S. (CP) — Publisher Michael Wardell of Fredericton rapped Maritime liquor laws Thursday night as he proposed ways of increasing the self-sufficiency of the Atlantic region.

"The tourist trade offers immense and ready rewards," he told delegates to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities here. Mr. Wardell is editor and publisher of the monthly Atlantic Advocate and the daily Fredericton Gleaner.

"No less than 55,000,000 Americans live within motoring distance of the Atlantic provinces. But a very large percentage of our American friends won't come here to be bullied by our archaic and unreasonable drinking laws based on prejudice and hatred of civil liberty."

Mr. Wardell said present figures indicate 400,000 visitors spend \$50,000,000 annually in the area. Their spending could be boosted 20 times by revising liquor laws with an accompanying improvement of entertainment and cultural attractions.

"If we would relinquish our intolerance about hotel licensing and properly cater to the tourist trade we would reap a revenue of \$1,000,000,000," he said.

The text of his remarks was released in advance of delivery.

Mr. Wardell said while efforts are made for new industries established with the help of federal money the Atlantic region and its people can "drive on within our own competence to create and enlarge revenue-producing industries."

Bringing Atlantic to one means of bringing about a greater degree of self-sufficiency.

"The value of retail sales in the Atlantic provinces . . . is \$1,200,000,000 a year." There was a deficiency in the Atlantic production of livestock and their products of \$77,000,000 a year. There was a lack of Atlantic products because people did not ask for them.

SEEK "RICH REWARD"

"If every one of us would do our utmost to buy Atlantic, if organized drives to that end were promoted by the municipalities we should reap a rich reward."

"Why not make this Christmas an Atlantic Christmas?" he asked. He suggested an exchange of gifts made in the region would be "good for those at home and better still for friends outside the Atlantic area. A reminder and an advertisement of what we have to offer."

Mr. Wardell said greater self-sufficiency can provide the remedy for the "continued disability in this area" predicted in the long-range forecast of the Gordon commission.

"The Gordon report took the forces at work within our society during the past generation and projected them into the future. . . . Such a method of calculation misses one crucial factor. It is that new forces may arise to take hold of the future and shape its ends."

SHOULD REMIND TORIERS

The publisher said the Atlantic provinces have the right and the duty to demand that the federal government implement all the pledges made by Progressive Conservative candidates during the election campaign.

Special adjustment grants and development of Atlantic power had been provided as promised.

The pledge of a Canadian coast guard had been shelved.

Four others had been pigeon-holed: A national program to develop resources, industrial decentralization, a freight rate adjustment and federal capital assistance to enlarge the basic economy.

"It is that the civil servants rule supreme and won't allow our legislators to carry out their pledges?" he asked. "If so, we have a right to know it."

NEED RATES ACTION

Mr. Wardell said the freight rate situation "cries for action. The only redeeming factor about the railways' demand for further boosts is "that the tremendous new burden of freight will act as the equivalent of a protective tariff against goods coming in to our area from outside."

He said that for "a wide variety of our needs" large doses of capital are needed. Industrial development corporations based on those in operation in New England were needed in this area.

"They would require federal aid," Mr. Wardell said. "We should press for it. We should drive for new industries, great and small, to be established with the help of federal funds. No less was promised and no less can be expected."
