BRITISH AFFAIRS

Resignation of the Government.

LONDON, Jan. 28. The Standard this morning says Lord Salisbury and Sir Michael Hicks Beach will announce in Parliament to-day the resignation of the Government. The Standard says Chamberlain will be the Irish Secretary in the Gladstone Government. It also says, all the continent except Russia regrets the resignation of the Tory Government. The Standard predicts that the next Cabinet will be shorter-lived than the present. It says the outlook is gloomy. Either England or Ireland will be torn apart or there will be a succession of short-lived governments, weakening the executive at home and abroad. The defeat of the government last night has left all the political parties in the House of Commons in a state of chaos and may result in a dissolution of parliament and an appeal to the country.

War Prospects.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 27. The inhabitants of the Island of Crete, three-fourth of whom are Greeks, are excited over the prospect of the arrival of a Greek squadron. There are only two Turkish iron-clads in Cretan waters, and they are stationed in Enda bay. They would be unable to resist the progress of a great fleet. The Turkish garrison on the Island numbers 10,000 men.

Grand Gubernatorial Ball

FREDERICTON, Jan. 27. The ball at Government House, this evening, given by Sir Leonard and Lady Tilley, which has been the principal topic of social interest for some time, was an unqualified success. In grandeur and brilliancy it is declared to surpass the great ball, given here upwards of twenty-five years ago, in honor of the Prince of Wales.

Heavy Failure.

TORONTO, Jan. 27. Peter Ryan, the well known reform politician and trade unionist, has failed with liabilities at from \$120,000 to \$125,000. Several months ago he bought out the Joseph Hall manufacturing works, Oshawa, to which he attributes his failures.

War Fever in Greece

ATHENS, Jan. 27. The war fever here is beyond the control of the King and the Premier. Premier Delagannis has sent a protest to England against the offensive tone assumed by Sir Horace Lambold.
