English Hockey Team Captures Churchill Cup

LONDON, March 20 (CP)—An "England" team, made up mostly of Canadian players, tonight scored a 6-4 upset victory over Edmonton Mercurys, Canada's world and Olympic hockey champions, to win the Churchill Cup.

The three-club competition, also involved the United States Olympic team, which was beaten by both Canada and the English entry.

The cup was offered for the first time last year when Lethbridge Maple Leafs won it.

The Mercurys were leading 2-0 early in the second period when the English side blew the game wide open by scoring three goals in three minutes.

Bill Glennie of Manitoba scored three goals to lead England's attack. Milt Swindlehurst of Winnipeg and Ottawa's Dave McGuire and Les Anning each scored once.

The Edmonton goal-getters were Sully Sullivan, Jack Davies, Billy Gibson and Engelbert Miller.

Late in the third period Canada made a desperate bid to save the game by pulling out their goalie for an extra forward. They scored their final goal with a six-man attack.

Period scores were 0-1, 4-1, 2-2. England's team was drawn from three National League clubs - Wembley, Earls Court and Haringey - and is regarded as one of the strongest combinations ever to represent the country.

The team has only one English-born player - Arthur Green. The others all were born in Canada - five in Montreal, five in Ottawa, three in Winnipeg, one in Quebec and one in Manitoba.

The Churchill Cup series was started last year by the British Ice Hockey Association whose secretary, Bunny Ahearne, then said it was hoped that the series would be a forerunner of a "real world" championship.
